He's a long-time member of the advisory council of the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute, which promotes ties between India and Canada through academic activities and cultural exchanges.

Dawn-Marie King was born in Barrie, the youngest of 2 children, raised by her grandparents and a single mother. Having been raised in a lower income family Dawn-Marie worked from a young age delivering newspapers and babysitting. As of the age of 14 she worked in a pizzeria to save money to go to university.

She attended the University of Waterloo in Science and then went on to graduate from Nuclear Medicine Technology. In keeping with her thirst for lifelong learning she completed her degree in Health Administration while working full time and then went on to complete her MBA at the Rotman School of Business.

Dawn-Marie started her career as a nuclear medicine technologist at Toronto Western Hospital. In 1991 she became the Clinical Coordinator for the Nuclear Medicine Program. In 1996 she started her career in leadership becoming a Nuclear Medicine Charge Technologist and eventually a Medical Imaging Manager at Princess Margaret Hospital and then at Toronto General Hospital, and finally a Director of Clinical Operations for the Joint Department of Medical Imaging at University Health Network, Mount Sinai Hospital and Women's College Hospital. After completing her MBA she secured a Director of Medical Imaging position at St. Michael's Hospital and most recently has been promoted to the Director of Clinical Support Services.

Throughout her professional career Dawn-Marie has volunteered for her professional society and college. She was Chair of the Committee on Education for 6 years for the Canadian Association of Medical Radiation Technologists, and for 7 years the Nuclear Medicine representative on the Quality Assurance Committee for the College of Medical Radiation Technologists of Ontario. Dawn-Marie is also an Academic Coordinator for the Medical Radiation Sciences program at University of Toronto.

Dawn-Marie met her husband Jim at university and they have been together for 31 years. In her spare time Dawn-Marie is a volunteer Group Leader for the walking group at the High Park Running Room and has completed several half marathons and various other races including the 60 km Walk to End Women's Cancer raising over \$10,000 in donations. In the winter, Dawn-Marie and Jim like to downhill ski and snowshoe and in the summer they like to camp and hike and explore the great outdoors.

Frank Garcea was born in Vibo Valentia, Italy, Frank began his career with Getronics in 1983 after graduating from George Brown College with a diploma in Network Technology. Frank originally joined Getronics
