William Blair was appointed Chief of the Toronto Police Service on April 26, 2005. Chief Blair started his 35-plus year policing career as a beat officer in downtown Toronto, and continued with assignments in drug enforcement, organized crime units, and major criminal investigations. Promoted to the senior ranks of the Service, his postings included Divisional Commander, Community Policing Programs, and Detective Operations, responsible for all specialized investigative units. Chief Blair holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Toronto with dual disciplines of Economics and Criminology (1981), a Certificate in Law Enforcement Administration from the University of Toronto (1983) and a Certificate in Criminal Justice from the University of Virginia (1990). He is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation National Academy (1990), the Police Leadership Program of the University of Toronto, Rotman School of Business Management (2002) and the National Executive Institute (2006).

The Senior Citizens Committee Forum – by Bert Steenburgh



On Friday February 28th 2014 approximately 40 community leaders representing diverse perspectives and deep

knowledge of issues impacting senior citizens met at the National They were hosted by the Club. club's Senior Citizens Committee, supported by a number of other interested RCT members. We were there to guide the Senior Citizens Committee in the evolution of a strategic plan which will direct our efforts, financially and otherwise, as we continue a rich and proud history the RCT has of impacting the lives of seniors in our city to help them live with hope and dignity. We were lead by club member Dr. Sylvia Geist supported by members of the committee. Rotarians and community leaders worked in groups to develop key priorities to guide our club's efforts in the coming years as we invest our human financial resources to impact the lives of seniors in the most meaningful way possible. We started with a pretty large and open canvass and the early going was a difficult process with so many divergent views and perspectives represented in the room. A key guiding principle revolved around focusing upon a role and approaches which matched our club's resources and the desire to have a hands-on focus for our work. The Rotarians in the room made it clear to our community partners that, although we do have financial resources to invest, we like to be more than just "cheque writers."

3 key areas of service emerged;

- 1) Housing/Shelter/Support Services for Senior Citizens
- 2) Health /Nutrition
- Equitable and Fair Access To Services/Navigation / Transportation/ Pathways To Services

Each breakout group submitted almost 40 more specific program ideas under these broad areas of service providing more concrete guidance to drive our planning. Here are a few examples;

- 1. 211 (information line for seniors) providing ease of navigation across Toronto
 - expansion of model
 - leverage what already exists
 - bring partners together
 - feed into a data bank
 - commit to its promotion/build awareness about the model
- 2. Support existing access programs such as CNAP Community Navigation and Access Program
- 3. Support a peer support network seniors helping seniors

All ideas put forward will require further consideration and investigation. The Senior Services Committee came away with the following key follow-up actions;

- 1) To analyze & synthesize key findings from the Forum
- 2) To determine the next steps and whether more information and/or data is needed
- 3) To develop the Community Advisory Group: Terms of Reference, parameters, purpose, function and a membership that will represent the diversity of Toronto and its issues.

The forum evaluations presented by all attendees rated the session in the 'good' to 'excellent' category. Many of the participants also commended the club for hosting this opportunity for these agencies to come together – a rare event in their experience and a good opportunity to exchange ideas with each other as well as with Rotarians. Our club has been working to make a positive difference in the lives of senior citizens in our community from very early on in our existence. We have a proud history of doing so, not the least of which is the founding, building and operation of Rotary Laughlin Lodge midway through the 20th century and culminating more recently as a lead donor in the establishment of a new home for at-risk seniors operated by the YWCA on the grounds of the former Laughlin Lodge. It is a source of pride to see RCT members rolling-up their sleeves and working side-by-side in 2014 to continue this rich history. We are all so fortunate for the opportunity to be a part of and continue such a great heritage. Watch for ways you can be engaged in this important work in the months and years ahead.

here in Florida is worthwhile. Its sunny and 80f as I write this. Other than weather, one of the main draws for us, is going to the Spring Training baseball games. Its eleven years now and I keep saying, "maybe this is the year for the Blue Jays". Well frankly, I don't think the 'boys in blue' are showing signs of making it a banner year, but it's still fun to sit in the sun and enjoy a hot dog and a beer photo is of 'The Beer Man' the day before St. Pats Day. The Seminole Rotary

Club where I usually do a 'makeup' is thriving with 63 members including a few part-time Canadian members (called "semi chiefs" for some reason). I am always interested when they start the meeting by pledging allegiance to the flag and singing God Bless America.... and they conclude the meeting by reciting the Four Way Test. Rotary may be worried about membership but 'Seminole' is a good example of the fellowship and community spirit

that exemplifies so many Rotary clubs around the world. Their golf tournament is this week so I have volunteered to assist. I think my job will be to stand at one of the greens to verify a 'hole in one', in the unlikely event that it occurs. I think the prize is \$10,000. One of the other prizes at the banquet following the golf is a Booze Barrel, where your lucky number gets you a choice of bottles, as donated by club members. You never know what he may have in his pocket! We shall be back in Toronto in a few weeks and as always, it will be good to get home.
