R.H. Thomson, one of Canada's foremost actors and directors, includes among his accolades the Toronto Drama Bench Award for his "outstanding body of work" spanning thirty vears and covering theatre, film, television and the Gascon-Thomas Award recognizing his career in the arts. On stage, his theatre roles

have ranged from Marc Antony in Julius Caesar at Canada's Stratford Festival to Glenn Gould in the play, Glenn. R.H. Thomson was Artistic Director for the 1991/1992 Season of Toronto's World Stage Theatre Festival as well as the Co-Artistic Director of the Shakespeare Works until 2006. He hosted Man Alive on the CBC for three seasons. In 2001, he wrote and performed a solo show called *The Lost* Boys, based on 750 letters from his great uncles who served in World War I, ultimately planting the seed of the Vigil Project. The play's CBC television version delivered R.H. Thomson his second Gemini Award. Among his other performances are included his role as Dr. Banting in the award-winning Glory Enough for All, the long-running series, The Road to Avonlea and the film, Ticket to Heaven. In 2007, he co-created and produced Vimy Vigil in Ottawa for Veterans Affairs in Canada and, in 2010, with the support of Veterans Affairs and the Churchill Society, he cocreated and produced the Vigil event from Ypres in schools across Canada as a special remembrance of Canada's war heroes. He currently lives in Toronto with his wife and two sons. Today, he describes his remarkable and ambitious new project, The World Remembers, 1914-1918.

She is a life-long learner and has over the last year learned some of the hardest and most valuable lessons of her life. She is proud to call Canada home and deeply privileged to join the amazing Rotary community.



New member Brigitte Bogar is the founder and artistic director of Nordic Opera Canada. She conducts the Toronto Swedish Singers, has performed Opera with the Concert Chorus, Toronto Operetta Theatre, Summer Opera Lyric Theatre, and has sung Beethoven's Ninth Symphony with the London Symphonic Orchestra. She has lectured on music and theater.

Among her newest accomplishments is a CD recording of unknown songs by George Bernard Shaw and his mother. With degrees in Music and Theatre, she is currently teaching and a PhD Candidate in Music at York University. She is the Vice President, Conference for the Mid-Atlantic Popular/ American Culture Association, planning and running a yearly conference with 450-plus participants in the US. After a number of announcements, President Elect Dave introduced two new members to our Club: Brigitte Bogar, an artistic director and accomplished artist in music and theater, and Tamara Levine who has enjoyed experience in international development, green growth and work with bilateral and multilateral donors. There are about one billion people around the world that go hungry every night and a child dies every six seconds of hunger-related causes. Kids Against Hunger partners with community groups, service clubs and other organizations to respond to hunger by providing nutritious meals for the hungry, and to do so, to host Food Packing events throughout Canada. The world's leading food scientists developed this revolutionary food package. It consists of protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals, all for only 23 cents per serving.

Amazingly, six weeks of food packages will transform a child's life. Kids Against Hunger food-packaging satellites operate in countries choose where the food will be distributed. Kids Against Hunger relies on the expertise of trustworthy partners that will get the food safely to its destination.

Kids Against Hunger is a volunteer organization. Local volunteers are essential for mobilizing the energy of people of all ages to help starving children around the world. Involvement also promotes leadership, teamwork, spiritual togetherness and community growth.
