

Born in Belleville and a resident of Toronto, John Plumpton is an educator, historian, writer and well-respected lecturer. For many years he was a teacher and then assumed а leadership role as Superintendent of Schools in Toronto. After his retirement from the Board of Education John

led and conducted summer programs in Oxford England for high schools and universities for twelve years. John continues to teach history at Ryerson University and at the University of Toronto with their adult learning programs. For many years John served as President of The Churchill Centre in Washington D.C. overseeing an international board of directors of prominent leaders and Churchillians throughout the United Kingdom, the United States and Europe and was the first Canadian to hold that international position. He is a frequent literary contributor and authority in why history is relevant and what it continues to teach us; lessons that must never be forgotten. He currently serves as a director of the Churchill Society for the Advancement of Parliamentary Democracy and is actively involved in the World Remembers program with R.H. Thomson. He is a popular speaker among a variety of groups and most recently spoke at Fort George in Niagara-on-the-Lake to the Niagara Sea Cadets at their annual dinner on the topic of "Remembering the War". In fact he is speaking every day for two weeks to community groups, university alumnae and various other groups about the importance of Remembrance Day.

Our Aboriginal Service Committee, led by chair John Andras and past-chair Chris Snyder, introduced the lead-off plenary session featuring speakers from the Aboriginal community with their very special stories. Considering the recent government report on the abuses suffered for so many years through the Residential Schools Program, this presentation was so very timely. Let us hope that our new government will follow up well and quickly to address the abuses and the fallout within the reserves. The refugee crisis needs to be dealt with and quickly. Lorna Pitcher and Maureen Bird had a table for Refugee Sponsorship information. Our club will be working to sponsor a family and we are going to try to share information across the District. The number of refugees around the world has grown to over 17 million and the situation is only worsening.

WE ARE THIS CLOSE! And we are getting even closer in our fight to end Polio. Nigeria has not had a case in over a year. Pakistan and Afghanistan have experienced a total of 51cases year-to-date. We celebrated with some fun fundraising and then raised The Rotary Sail, a 45-foot sail from a Rotarian who took his sailboat around the world to spread our theme message. It was erected by a crane and flew for hours on Queens Quay for all to see. Then some Rotarians climbed 34 floors to get in shape for the Kilimanjaro Climb to End Polio, led by Super Girl, Jennifer Boyd, our district polio chair.

Sunday's plenary session centered on the presentation by Bugiri chair Joe Clarke and Ron Denham of the Toronto Eglinton Club. They have taken on the task of raising US\$250,000 for a global grant in Bugiri, Uganda, for a WASH (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene project) which will provide water supplies, model improved latrines, wash stations and menstrual and hygiene training in 10 schools, benefiting 7200 students. David Libby and Maureen Bird are working with their four-club committee. Joe's jaw dropped when, while thanking them, President Lisa Brooks of Uxbridge, presented him with their club's cheque for \$3,000.

effort with the help of a great team. Rather than re-invent the wheel we will be working with groups with long term experience. AURA (Anglican United Refugee Alliance) will be our Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH) with Citizenship and Immigration Canada and Rosedale United Church has agreed to hold our bank account. Our guest speaker on December 4 will be Ian McBride from AURA. Please plan to attend. Our goal is to raise \$40,000 in the next two months, the amount required to support a family of 6 in Toronto. We will need to cover rent, transportation and a living allowance for one year. We will need to work with them for this one-year period. Canada is the only country in the world that has created this private sponsorship route. We can be proud to be Canadians. We would welcome all ideas for fundraising and will keep you updated. On a pleasantly cool fall day, club members collected in the Upper Canada Room at the Fairmont Royal York Hotel. The music, as always, was enjoyable. Club president, David Hetherington, introduced the head table and Past-President Sylvia Milne introduced the guests and visiting Rotarian, Ron Denham. There were announcements from Maureen

Bird about the new international sponsorship subcommittee for sponsoring refugee families to Canada. There was also a reminder from John Andras about the upcoming First Nations' lunch on November 27th and getting tickets in advance before things are sold out.

Ross Amos next introduced the guest speaker, Bruce Bell. Bruce was a wonderful speaker and very knowledgeable about Toronto's history. He's even written two books about our wondrous city. He opened up with a

bit of humour about Canada vs. the US and the early history Canada. Some of highlights the of included: the history of Front St. and its evolution; the history of the Fairmont Royal York Hotel and how 200 buildings used to be where it now gloriously stands; the US revolution and

its effects on Canada; the involvement of John Graves Simcoe in our City's history; and, the emancipation of slavery. Bruce went on to describe the early days of railway in Ontario and the history of the Union Stations, the war of 1812 and the fires not only of Toronto (Fort York, the Sir Isaac Brock warship, the libraries, etc.) but the fire at the White House in the US. He even gave us the history of the Upper Canada Room, when it used to be a rooftop ballroom of twice the height. After being thanked and asked to come back at a later date, a donation was made on his behalf to 416 Community Support for Women.
