Christopher J. Rutty is a Toronto-based professional medical historian in private practice with special expertise in the history of public health, vaccines and biotechnology in Canada. After completing a diploma in Classical Animation at Sheridan College, Chris shifted focus to science and the history of science and medicine at the University of Western Ontario during the 1980s. He then received his

PhD in History from the University of Toronto in 1995 and focused his dissertation on the history of polio in Canada. He has since written and presented extensively about the history of polio and polio vaccines.

Since establishing his Health Heritage Research Services consulting firm in 1995 <<http://healthheritageresearch.com>>, Dr. Rutty has provided research, writing and creative services to a variety of clients, most notably Sanofi Pasteur Canada (formerly Connaught Laboratories), which is marking its centenary this year. A notable current project is managing the Sanofi Pasteur Canada Centenary Facebook page that features many postings about the history of polio and polio vaccines. Chris has also published histories of St. Mary's General Hospital in Kitchener, the history of the Canadian Nurses Association, and the history of public health in Canada for the Canadian Public Health Association. He has also curated several historical exhibits, including exhibits on the discovery of insulin, the history of the Faculty of Medicine at University of Toronto, the history of public health teaching, research and public service in Toronto, and the history of vaccines and immunization in Canada at the Museum of Health Care in Kingston. A central feature of the Kingston exhibit is an iron lung built in 1937 at the Hospital for Sick Children; an online version of this exhibit is expected to launch in late October.

Chris Rutty will be joined by a special guest, Roger Ashby. Roger is host of "Roger, Darren & Marilyn," a radio personality and polio survivor.

Harper Receives Rotary Foundation Polio Eradication Champion Award

On October 18, Prime Minister Stephen Harper received the Rotary Foundation Polio Eradication Champion Award for his longstanding support and continued leadership in efforts to eliminate polio around the world. The Prime Minister accepted the award at a ceremony hosted by the Canadian Rotary Foundation in Toronto. Upon receiving the award, the Prime Minister made the following statement.




Prime Minister Harper receiving the Polio Eradication Champion Award

I am honoured to receive this prestigious award that recognizes the significant efforts and contributions that our Government continues to make towards eradicating polio. We will continue to work with our partners to help put an end to this devastating childhood disease that can be prevented with a simple vaccine.

The Polio Eradication Champion Award is the highest honour the Rotary Foundation presents to heads of state, health agency leaders and others who have made significant contributions to the global polio eradication effort. The Foundation undertakes worldwide Rotary campaigns such as eradicating polio and promoting peace.

The Government of Canada has been at the forefront of the fight against polio. Since 2006, Canada has disbursed significant funds to eradicate polio, namely through support to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), to which Canada is one of the top donors. At the Global Vaccine Summit in April 2013, Canada reconfirmed its commitment to polio eradication and pledged funds over six years to support the GPEI's 2013-2018 Endgame Strategic Plan which sets out a roadmap to eradicate polio by 2018.

What You Missed October 17 2014

Coming off the escalator to the Convention Level of the Fairmont Royal York Hotel we were met by a Shelter Box tent and displays from Honouring Indigenous People (HIP), Canadian Landmines Foundation, a display on water and tables of Rotary merchandise. We knew this was to be a very special meeting. We were joined in the Concert Hall by 450 Rotarian guests from the Zone 24 and 32 Institute representing Canada, the United States, Bermuda, Russia and France. We were all gathered to hear from Rotary International President Elect (2014-2015) K. R. "Ravi" Ravindran.

Many of our guests were tempted to extend their visit to Toronto after Neil Phillips outlined the upcoming "Que Syrah Shiraz" evening at the National Club on November 12. They certainly are planning to return after hearing plans from Michele Guy and Toronto Scarborough Rotarian Mike Cooksey about The Rotary International Convention in 2018. All GTA Rotarians will have a once-in-a-generation opportunity to showcase our city and introduce the power of Rotary to thousands of potential members.

President Elect Ravi, in his presentation, used examples from his career. His family business was lost due to political change. He rebuilt, starting a printing business in a garage. It grew to be Printcare PLC, a major international printer of 100 million tea labels per month with a worldwide clientele. Finding an underserved market, developing efficiencies, and cost containment were key to his success. He believes these lessons are also the key to Rotary International's future. He pledged that, under his Presidency, Rotary International will operate in a more efficient businesslike manner. He pledged that appointments under his Presidency would be made strictly on merit and that expenses would be monitored to cut out any waste.

He also emphasized the importance of the campaign to eradicate Polio. Using an example from his homeland, Sri Lanka, he discussed how important the vaccine drops are to the communities. During the civil war in his country a cease fire was negotiated to allow for inoculation in the middle of the conflict zone.

The gift of a Polio-free world, which is in reach, will be a profound gift. Attitudes are changing. An army of volunteers from around the world has been mobilized, united by a common goal. Rotary is proving that even the most intractable global problems can be resolved given resources, courage and persistence. "The world is watching," President Elect Ravi told us. We must redouble our efforts to get the job done. Failure is not an option. All readers will be delighted to know that I did not win either the wine or the cash and the pot continues to grow!

The Rotary Club of Toronto joins with all Canadians in offering condolences to the family and friends of Warrant Officer Patrice Vincent and Corporal Nathan Cirillo, both of whom died in apparent terrorist attacks this past week. "O Canada, we stand on guard for thee."
