Kelly Ku returns from Siberia!

There used to be a time when going to Siberia was not a good thing. Times have changed!

We were delighted to hear from Kelly Ku, Rotoractor and world traveller, at our September 3 meeting.



Some background...

Kelly is a Past President of the Rotaract Club of Toronto. In this Rotaract year, she served on the planning committee for Interota and participated in a Rotaract Roundtrip to Siberia. The trip has inspired her to begin working on organizing a Toronto Rotaract Roundtrip in the next year. Kelly loves to travel with Rotaract. She will be attending REM (Rotaract Europe Meeting) in Poznan, Poland this fall.

Into the Russian deep freeze...

Kelly landed in Russia in -27° January weather. Even for a Canadian this was cold! She was stranded in Moscow for a day because of Visa problems, but found it a welcome stop as she got to see some famous sights. Then off to <u>Stolby</u> <u>National Park</u>, famous for its rock formations, a restaurant where they ate borsht, and sledding down hills through the trees!

The group stayed 3 days in Kemerovo, where they toured a coal mine and went on a "city quest" to find Russian dolls. In <u>Novosibirsk</u>, capital of Siberia, they saw the second largest ballet in Russia. An 8 hour ride on the <u>Trans Siberian Railway</u> took them to <u>Omsk</u>, where they were met by local Rotaractors, who showed them around this very European city. They volunteered for a day at an orphanage, went ice fishing (Kelly caught a fish!), got some locally-made vodka and gave their Rotaractor hosts a Canadian flag as a memento before leaving for home.

In answer to questions, there was some general discussion about transitioning from being a Rotaractor to being a member of a Rotary club. She advised that transitioning can be difficult as there are barriers such as the relative high cost, age differences, and time of day, as most young people would need to meet after work in a nearby location. She thought clubs like Toronto Twilight or Toronto Skyline might be good places to transition to in Toronto, given their demographics and after-work hours; also, some clubs like Rotary Toronto have lower fees for new members.

John Liu's Personal Journey

Robert Frost's poem *The Road Not Taken*, was the backdrop for John Liu's presentation on September 10 about his own personal journey.



John was a self-described "high school nerd", studying hard and working at part-time jobs to get into the Schulich School of Business and prepare for a life as an investment banker. But by second year, he began to consider taking a lesstravelled road, and took four months off to travel through Europe and find out what he really wanted in life. In the process he visited 9 countries and 27 cities and spoke to hundreds of young people.

His transformative experience lead him to consider entrepreneurship and starting his own business. He came back with a file of 40 new business ideas to explore. But the one he landed upon with a business partner is an alternative to unhealthy energy drinks, called BUFF. This drink is healthy, with low sugar and caffeine, and will hopefully appeal to the gamer community, big consumers of energy drinks. His new company, <u>Lumin</u> <u>Strategic</u>, was created to find and promote new ventures.

John now speaks to former middle and high schools to inspire and support them in their dreams.
