Jordana Lowe speaks about Rotaractors' help for Haitians in the Dominican Republic

Rotaractors have HHart!

At our April 7th meeting, U. of T. Rotaractor Jordana Lowe told us about the work of HHART in the Dominican Republic.

Assistance and Relief Team, a Rotaryfunded project in the DR providing relief to the disadvantaged, primarily of Haitian descent, in the Puerto Plata area. HHART provides desperately needed medical and dental services, as well as health education and other assistance.

Jordana went in 2012 and again in 2015 to see for herself and help out as a Rotaractor. She says 90% of the people there have some form of dental disease, so the dental services have enormous impact. HHART stages annual "missions" to provide the services, each time with specific goals. It is supported, organized and led by Rotarians from Wasaga Beach Rotary and District 7010, with funding also from the Rotary Foundation.


To help raise money for the HHART dental team, the U. of T. Rotaractors staged a "polar bear dip" in March, which she says was a lot of fun!

We learn more about Don

Our longest-serving member Don Foster gave an interesting mini-classification speech April 14th.

Don was born on a farm near Shelbourne Ontario. His father didn't really enjoy farming, so the family moved into town, and his father partnered with a veteran to buy a funeral and furniture business. Don worked in the business, doing everything from being a greeter to driving an ambulance!

The principal of Don's high school got Don interested in shop class, and Don soon became proficient in carpentry. He came to Toronto in 1953 and joined Yorke Brothers, later Turner and Porter, which bought Yorke after Hurricane Hazel. In 1968, he went to Humber College, which assumed the task of education for Ontario's funeral directors, and developed a comprehensive program. Don always felt there wasn't enough training in "people skills", so he emphasized that. Don was at Humber 31 years until retirement.
