The International President was Sydney W. Pascall of London, England.

In July, 1931, there were 3460 Clubs with 15,700 members. The Truro Club is No. 2314 with membership in October 1931 at 39 and on November, 1931 the membership was 41.

On Sept. 1931, Frank Stanfield Sr. died.

New members voted into the Truro Club were Dr. E. C. Harris on October 21, '31 and Joseph P. McCarthy on November, 1931. Nelson Allott was voted into membership in March of 1932 but moved away in April 1932.

On Friday, December 4, 1931, the Rotary address by Past Presidents, F. L. Lewis, A. R. Coffin, E. P. Bentley and H. L. Daniel. President C. O. Doyle in the chair.

Gordon Taylor, Rotarian was President of the Boy Scouts Association.

In September, 1931, the club transported the Alice St. School children to the T. A. A. C. for the field day held there.

Lea Payzant of New Glasgow was a member of the Canadian Advisory Committee.

On January 8, 1932, Clarence Dunlap spoke to the club on Aerial Survey Work. On January 15, 1932, luncheon guests were The Municipal Council. February 26, 1932 was Ladies night, this being held in the Scotia Hotel. Also in February, 1932, we lost two members, John H. Slackford and R. H. Davison, both of who resigned. Lew Pattillo resigned in March of 1932. From February to June, 1932 all the speakers at the luncheon meetings were Rotarians. In February, 1932 also, a Curling Match was held at Windsor, with Rotary Clubs participating.

May, 1932 was the District Convention, this being held in Kentville. Truro Club was represented by ten members and six wives.

In June of 1932, the Community Service brought to the attention of the Club, a boy, aged 20 yrs. Mr. Laird. The subject of this boy was fits. The club were authorized to proceed with X-Rays and examinations to see if anything could be done. \$20.00 expenses incurred.

The club authorized the sum of \$25.00, two tents for the swimming pool project. Pete Mills head of same.

The club transported the ball team to Great Village for a baseball game.

In July, 1933, one of the oldest active Rotarians in Canada was Judge S. D. McLellan who recently had celebrated his 81st birthday. He is very active and attended the International Convention at Boston. A great sportsman and angler, before leaving for Boston, he landed two sea trout, 2 3/4 lbs and 2 1/2 lbs. He was admitted to the bar of Nova Scotia on November 18, 1876, and was Judge of Probate Court from November 1887.

On July 1, 1933 the club were 40 members strong. Geo. Kent resigned and Dr. Patton joined, membership remained at 40 members at June 30, 1934.

On July 26, 1933 a Rotary picnic was held at Spencers Point at the cottage of Harry Chase.

In August, 1933, a Interclub picnic was held at Brooklyn, Hants County with Rotarians from Truro, Windsor, Kentville attending.

District Governor for this year was Charles Hunt of St. Johns, Nfld. who attended our Club on August 23rd, 1933.

The District Association was held at Yarmouth on August 16, and 17, 1933. Members attending from Truro Club were R. A. Mingie and J. P. McCarthy.

A presentation was made to Percy Bentley in September 1933, the occasion being his wedding to Jen Pattillo in Wolfville.

The Rural Urban Meeting was held in Old Barns in October 1933, The speaker for this meeting was Dr. Coady of St. F. X. University in Antigonish, N. S.

In February, 1934, our Annual Ladies Night was held at the Scotia Hotel. \$1.50 per plate. The guest speaker for the evening was Rev. Allen of New Glasgow.

In March, 1934, Clarence Dunlop spoke to the Rotary Meeting on "Aviation".

April 5th, and 6th, 1934 brought forth the Truro Rotary Minstrel Show. This show was held in the Graphic Theatre. Chairman for the show was James Pirie. The Executive Committee was Jerry McElhinney and Douglas Baker. The Music was under the leadership of Douglas Baker. Gordon Taylor had charge of the properties and was stage director. A. R. Coffin was in charge of Publicity and advertising.

Interlocutor was Ed. McColough and the endmen were Fred Blois, H. W. Murdock, Gordon Taylor, Elmer Doyle and Jack Glassey. This minstrel show was again a successful event both histrionically and financially with net proceeds at \$163.54.

The District Conference was held in Halifax in May of 1934. Those attending from Truro were Ed. McColough and Elmer Doyle.

The International Convention was held in Detroit June 25 to 29th, 1934.

On June 16, 1934, the Rotary Meeting had a joint meeting with the Board of Trade and the Kiwanis Club to hear Dis Henry Drayton, who spoke on Government Finances.

In July, 1934 another one of our members was married. Joseph P. McCarthy.

On May 25, 1934, the speaker for the meeting was Judge Geo. Patterson of New Glasgow who spoke on "Experiences on the Bench".
