#### Secretary's Report

Dear Fellow Rotarians;

When our President asked me to give a report I was at a loss since all committee chairmen present their reports.

Lest I forget I shall attach a small itemized bill for out of pocket expenses that I have a record of. The rest can be charged up to part of service to Rotary.

This has been a pleasure. I remember President Dexter one time remarking that he did not understand how some men were able to do so many things and that time to him seemed to run out. Now I can say that I do not understand how Dexter has been able to find the time to look after the many details of Rosary along with his practice and other activities. There have been times when I have told him that I was going to recommend him to the Prime Minister for the Diplomantic Corp.
