

St. Valentine, she said, secretly married couples in a day when the emperor preferred his soldiers single and presumably more fit to fight. He was beheaded on Feb. 14—thus the holiday. Seeking more peaceful outcomes, Gina suggested a variety of ideas for modern men, including the useful

admonishment, "Never buy appliances or anything with a cord." Her ideas for women ranged from weekend getaways to bowling.

Homesteaders, cheap land and Lincoln

Maureen Kelly Jonason, executive director of the Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County, introduced archivist Mark Peihl. Mark's focus was on Abraham Lincoln's impact on Clay County ... by signing key legislation that brought more than 10,000 people here in the 15 years after the arrival of the railroad.

Lincoln signed the Homestead Act in 1862. After living on their claims for five years, homesteaders owned their farms. To qualify, settlers had to be 21 years old, live on the land and make improvements in five years, and (within seven years) file a "proof."

Only 40 percent of those who attempted to homestead were successful. Almost 80 women were among them, including many widows and single mothers. They accounted for about 6 percent of Clay County homesteaders. The ratio, Mark said, was much higher in the Williston area, where about 18 percent of successful claims were by women.

An alternate route was to purchase land from the Northern Pacific Railroad, acreage it received in 1864 through a national land grant also signed by Lincoln. At \$2.50 per acre, cheap land was purchased by would-be farmers and speculators alike. They also purchased other low-cost land including mixed-blood scrips and school lands.

By 1885, 50 percent of the settlers were immigrants. Of those, half were Norwegians.

Mark recommended a visit to Bonanzaville's special Lincoln exhibit for more insight into how his actions contributed to the settlement of our region.
