

Gary & Cindy Nolte trace history of Rotary's Polio Plus campaign



Noltes tell of working with PolioPlus

Rotarian of the Day Jean turned the microphone over to Gary and Cindy Nolte. They have been involved in Rotary International's worldwide campaign to eradicate polio since 1988, when Gary joined Moorhead Rotary. After standing at his side over the years, she became a member herself in 2013. Both have served as club presidents; Gary has served as district governor, and currently handles the Polio Plus portfolio for the Rotary Foundation. Together, they have completed four polio immunization trips overseas.

Gary traced Rotary's huge mission back to 1988, when it became a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Back then, he said, the deadly crippling disease was present in 172 nations around the globe. Today it survives in only two. "The last case reported this year was in January," he said.

Polio travels through water and infects through the digestive system. He said 99% of those who

contract the virus have no ill effect. But for the others, it can be dire. Polio is a viral disease that may affect the spinal cord, causing muscle weakness and paralysis. The polio virus enters the body through the mouth, usually from hands contaminated with the stool of an infected person. Victims sometimes have needed "iron lungs" to be able to breathe.

Rotary's goal, Cindy explained, is to vaccinate all the world's children before they turn 5. "If you're over 5 and haven't gotten it, you probably won't," the retired nurse observed.

Vaccinations are still ongoing all over the world. Our goal is to be polio-free by 2026 ... but 10 more years of vaccination will still be needed to insure that it stays gone. Gary said Rotary has set up surveillance clinics around the globe to watch for outbreaks of polio and other diseases. They have proven valuable now in the fight against Covid.

Volunteers like the Noltes travel for Rotary missions on their own dime. They shared some of their touching — and weird — experiences along the way. Asked what she has taken away from their services, Cindy revealed one memorable lesson: "I never want to ride on a camel again!"
