
#### No Meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 28

#### **Dovre shares annual Christmas message**

Concordia president William Craft introduced our speaker, his predecessor Paul Dovre, via Zoom. Paul's Christmas messages have been a Rotary tradition for many, many years.

Paul asked the group, "Did you ever not get what you wanted for Christmas, or not get what you expected?" He quoted the Rolling Stones: "You don't always get what you want ... but if you try, sometimes, you get what you need."

Mick Jagger's famous lyric sums up the text of Paul's message. He told of people in the time of Jesus who expected something very different than what they got. "Based on their reading (or misreading) of the prophets, lots of people expected victory and justice and homecomings. Instead," he said, "they got continuing subjugation, separation, and injustice.

"Jesus brought a message of love to the hearts of people, not a conquest of their external enemies. And out of such love, individuals and then groups of individuals would experience a reshaping and redirection of their lives and the lives of the communities they built.

"In short, the light shined into the darkness of their lives and the darkness could not overcome that light."

After centuries of captivity and exploitation by the

Assyrians, the Babylonians and finally the Romans, they dreamed of the promised land envisioned by Abraham, David and Moses: a promised land ruled with equity and centered on the teachings of God. But it had long been destroyed due to internal betrayals and unfaithfulness on the one hand, and the power of oppressors on the other. Yahweh was not the center of their universe, either politically or religiously."

Paul continued, "Based on prophecies of Micah, Zephaniah and Jeremiah, it was likely that what folks were taking from these prophecies was a vision of victory, plenty and dominance, rather than something as seemingly modest as the changing of individual hearts. For centuries they had been praying for victory and dominance as a nation, not quiet hearts and individually generated good works."

Instead, he said, they got light in the darkness — the light of forgiveness and renewal.

"We are going to celebrate the light again today and this season because this promise that came from God in Christ still holds," Paul said. "And I stress that it begins, not in a God-led, overnight revolution of society, but in a spirit-driven change of hearts — yours, mine, and our neighbor's. You can start anew—no if's, ands or buts.

God calls us to this work and has given us the lights of His grace and strength to do it," he asserted. "And the evidence is clear. With the help and hand of God, we can do this."
