F5 Project founder Adam Martin describes his work helping felons get lives on track

and can also be downloaded from ClubRunner. A foursome and hole sponsorship is \$600; the foursome alone is \$500, and sponsorship is \$150. The entry fee for an individual golfer is \$125.

Martin: 'I need to be Good Samaritan'

Rotarian of the Day Jon Riewer introduced our speaker, Adam Martin, who told of how he came to found the F5 Project. The project works with felons who have completed their sentences, helping them find a place to live and employment, as well as mentors to help them establish productive, healthy lives in the community.

Adam described his background and childhood, and how that influenced his early adult life. His parents met in a treatment program, so he joked, "I was jinxed from the beginning." He started drinking in seventh grade.

He was repeatedly convicted of criminal offenses throughout his teens and 20s and sentenced five times to jail. "I sobered up at age 31," he said. To do it, he told the group, "I had to be in a place were there were people to help me. They were always there, but I had to be ready."

Adam emphasized that rehabilitation and grace work better than mandating morals. The support of his sponsors turned him around ... "and so," he added, "I pay it forward. To stay sober, I need to be a Good Samaritan every day." Then he pointed out, "The Samaritan expected nothing in return. Neither do I."

F5 has established several houses for exoffenders, taking almost all of those who show up and ask for help. The motto is, "You show up. We take care of you." F5 helps them get jobs, find the household goods they need, or help in other ways. Adam said, "We wait for them to tell us what they need."

Two F5 Project veterans, Sergio and Lenard, told their stories. In 1995, at age 18, Sergio was sentenced to 29 years for drugs, guns and gang activities. "I went in bitter," he told us. After 25 years in prison, he was released and got involved with the program. He had only a 6th grade education, no drivers license and no job. He enrolled in classes and lived in an F5 facility.

Now he is a life coach, helping others with similar challenges. "I learn from others and grow," he said

Lenard, a father of three from Chicago, grew up around drugs and gangs. His father was a heroin user, and he went down the same path. After his mother moved to Minnesota when he was 13, he didn't change. He was in and out of jail until finally he faced a 10-year sentence. "I started thinking about my kids," he said, and finally figured out who he was. "I decided to be a good dad," he said. Now, after taking classes and getting his life in order, he is involved in their lives.

"I am trying to be a good example," he said, and to change the world one person at a time."
