'Unseen' works with groups around world to combat human trafficking

Sergeant at Arms Stacey points out highlights in 'Rotarian', talks about CARES

After trivia master Brent Brandt quizzed members on famous war movies, Sergeant at Arms Stacey Ackerman drew members' attention to the current month's Rotarian magazine, its photo edition. "It's so inspirational to see other Rotary clubs' fund-raising and charitable good works," she observed.

Drawing on her professional knowledge with the Wells Fargo Wealth Management Group, she highlighted three points members should know about in the federal CARES Act, all related to their charitable contributions.

- 1. Everyone can claim a deduction for up to \$300 given to charity, including those who don't itemize.
- 2. The usual regioned minimum distributions from IRAs are waived this year. If you do take one for a gift to charity, that too can be deducted.

Fargo-based charity works in 35 countries to aid 40.3 million in slavery

Dave Sederquist introduced our speaker, Than Baardson, whom he has known since he was a child. Baardson is co-founder and CEO of Unseen, a nonprofit that works as the marketing arm of charities around the world that seek to combat human trafficking — serving to build their capacity to fight human trafficking and its root causes.

Baardson told Rotarians that 40.3 million people of all ages around the world are trapped in slavery. One out of four of them is a child. Living in extreme poverty, an estimated 150 million orphans are a major source for traffickers. Human trafficking is when a person is forced into a service against their will — usually forced work or prostitution. Often one person controls another by exploiting a vulnerability. The control can be physical, financial, or psychological. It's believed to be the world's fastest growing criminal industry.

According to his website, *weareunseen.org*, Economics is the root cause of the trade. Trafficking is cost-effective, meeting consumers' demand for low-priced goods and services. It's profitable.

This leads to recruiting and coercing low-cost laborers or slaves to produce goods (clothing, coffee, fish) and offer services (paid sex, domestic help) at lower prices and higher volume. This labor is performed by the most economically desperate, who are at high risk of exploitation.

Unseen was founded in Fargo nine years ago.

Baardson said the nonprofit helps carefully vetted organizations around the world build their fundraising capacity and increase support through websites, videos, slide decks and print materials. The organization produces about 100 projects to help on the scene carry out their work. While its partners work closely with their governments and local law enforcement, his website explains the that most victims are afraid or prevented from reporting directly to official sources, creating a need for trusted third parties to identify vulnerable people, manage prevention programs, raise public awareness, provide aftercare, and train frontline professionals.

Originally a firefighter, Baardson now works with international clients as a broadcast journalist, speaker, documentary filmmaker, photographer, writer and communications specialist.

Asked about the local area, he cited a disturbing trend of child porn and exploitation. "Local law enforcement are working hard against it," he said.
