Ukrainian ag expert asks American farmers to donate 1 cent per bushel to victims of war

President Gina Monson welcomed members and visitors to a special meeting of Moorhead Rotary on June 14. Our guest was Roman Grynyshyn of Ukraine, who promoted the international campaign to urge American farmers to donate 1 cent per bushel of their harvest to their counterparts in Ukraine. He was joined by Hillsboro, North Dakota, farmer Jon Bertsch, who is hosting him, his wife and their three children while he talks to groups across the Midwest. Our group also included Gina's son Jake Monson, who works for Bertsch.

Kay Parries and Jean Hannig reported on their trip to the Rotary International convention in Houston earlier this month. Eleven thousand Rotarians were on hand for the first live event since the COVID 19 pandemic upset the usual annual routine.



Sarge Tim recaps Fargo Marathon

While Sergeant at Arms Tim Hiller missed the Fargo Marathon earlier this month, he shared some of the highlights. After summing up the event's history, he cited a few facts. The fastest time of completion to date has been two hours and one minute. The oldest entrant was 100 years old; the youngest, just 3.

Tim called for happy dollars. Gary Nolte announced his granddaughter Sarah has gotten a job as the assistant to the CEO of the Teddy Roosevelt Foundation in New York City. Kay pitched in to celebrate the excellent international convention, joined by Jean — who said she was a fun roommate. Guest John Vander Linden's happy buck was in honor of Dan Hannaher, who spoke in Fargo yesterday; he noted that Dan, a former longtime Moorhead Rotarian, originated the tradition of happy dollars. Finally, Gina offered 22 happy dollars in honor of our speaker ... and son Jake's 22nd birthday.

Grynyshyn family tells story of Russian attacks on Ukraine farmers and ag exports

Our international guest was introduced by Traill County farmer Jon Bertsch of GSD Enterprises in Hillsboro, parent company of Bertsch Farms. He met Roman in 2019 when Grynyshyn, who operates an international farm exchange firm called Travelite MICE &Travel Ukraine based in his home country. His goal was to bring Ukrainian farmers here to see how farmers use precision

equipment and techniques in North America's "breadbasket of the world" — a title also claimed by his homeland, which encompasses over a quarter of the world's black chernozem soil.

Ukraine is an agricultural powerhouse. According to the speaker, it ranked #1 in sunflower seed oil; #3 in corn and rapeseed; #4 in barley and walnuts; #5 in rye, honey and soybeans; #6 in wheat, sunflower seed and hogs; #7 in soybeans and dpoultry; #9 in milk powder, butter and cattle' and #10 in cheese and milk ... before the Russians attacked at the beginning of this growing season.

Production from the agricultural heartland, however, is being severely curtailed by Russia's attempted takeover of part of the independent nation. This year's harvest is predicted to be cut in half or even more. The problem is compounded by both direct attacks on farms and villages, and the enemy's destruction of port and rail facilities used to ship grain and other crops to a hungry world. The nation's production feeds 600 million people.

Grynyshyn is speaking to farm groups to raise funds for World to Rebuild Rural Ukraine's small farms, which represent 25 to 30% of the total. (Fifty-six percent of Ukrainians own farmland.) He told of homes and farm buildings deliberately destroyed, fields littered with dangerous unexploded bombs, and farmers driving tractors wearing helmets and flak jackets. WRRU is asking farmers here to give 1 cent for each bushel of their own havest to help rebuild Ukraine's agricultural industry — a process that will take years.
