Young women share their thoughts on applying the 4-Way Test to life situations

President Dave introduced three of the four teens whose essays topped the club's revived 4-Way Test essay contest, including Kadyn Sharpe, Julie Gramer and Maren Rygg, whose entry earned first place. The fourth winner, Parker Gast — grandson of Dave Tranby — could not be present because he was on the Spuds team competing in the state hockey tournament.

Rotary's famous Four- Way Test asks: First, is it the truth? Second, is it fair to all concerned? Third, will it build good will and better friendships? And fourth, will it be beneficial to all concerned.

Kadyn's essay focused on learning about the peoples of the world through travel. She expressed the belief that travel is an ideal setting for putting the 4-Way Test into action, broadening your horizons and your understanding of differences.

Julia wrote about the importance of integrating disabled and special ed students in school. She told of her experiences in the Peer to Peer classes,

which have encouraged her to be a good advocate for others and to have more empathy for them.

The subject of Maren's top-prize essay was the need for prison reform. She cited lessons learned in the Netherlands, advocating for the U.S. to adopt a more humane, rehabilitation-oriented model along the lines of European practices, especially the highly regarded prison system of Norway.

Hockey inspired several of the week's happy dollars. Teresa led off with applause for the Spuds girls and boys teams, both competing at the top level in the Minnesota state tournament.
