



Nancy Hanson shared an invitation to members of the club to attend an International Women's Day event March 8 sponsored by the F-M Lions Clubs.




Katie Burington describes the Emerging Digital Academy.

magazine, McInally said his interests for his coming year of service are for increased caring and better mental health for all. He lost a brother to suicide; Rob added that a colleague of his lost a son. His message connected with the song the club had just sung, "Try a Little Kindness."

Burington details the mission & program of the Emerging Digital Academy

Rotarian of the Day Jean Hannig introduced guest speaker Katie Burington to talk about the Emerging Digital Academy, a program developed by Fargo's Emerging Prairie organization to fast-track professional training in coding for computer programs and applications.

Burington, who grew up in Marshall, Minnesota, came to Fargo-Moorhead to attend Concordia College, from which she graduated in 2011. She noted that she is passionate about coaching people on their strengths — a boost to achieving their goals.



Called by its founders a "full-stack coding boot camp," the academy offers participants a way to become a qualified software engineer in just five months. Since its launch in March 2020, 60 men and women have graduated from the program. Burington reported that typical sessions have had five to eight students, but they could potentially accommodate 14 at a time.

Tuition is \$15,500. She added that scholarships are available as well as an innovative income-share program, in which students don't begin to repay their debt until they are employed and earning excellent salaries — often six figures. Graduates typically at least double their previous income. Ninety percent are employed in the field within the first six months after completing the course.

The next cohort of students begins their education March 20. The academy is currently accepting applications for the following session starting July 17; the deadline for registration is June 2

According to Burington, the curriculum is designed to emulate the on-the-job training experience that an entry-level developer would receive in the first few months at work. Students create connections to their fellow classmates, guest speakers, and local employers that they will be able to call upon throughout their careers. The classes use modern technologies like HTML5, CSS, JavaScript, git, React, and Node.js to teach foundational web concepts and techniques.
