Retinologist Max Johnson shares good news about progress in treating eye disease

Sarge Rob recounts election history

Sergeant at Arms Rob Remark observed Election Day by quizzing members about some American election history ... which left most members stumped. He asked a simple question to start: When was the first national election established? The answer — surprising to many — was 1845, nearly 70 years after the Declaration of Independence. It was set on Tuesdays, he said, because of the early emphasis on agriculture: "People went to church on Sunday, then had to travel to the polls Monday." As for the election's early format, he noted that originally the voting took place in a town-hall setting. Eligible voters merely raised their hands to vote for the candidate of their choice. Secret ballots weren't introduced until 1890.

After noting that President Dave had once again biked to the meeting, as he vowed to do in the

days when the weather was milder, Rob turned to collecting happy dollars. Jean Hannig spoke first, expressing her appreciation for being part of last weekend's Youth Exchange Conference. Sue Koesterman, who had no change, donated \$20 in honor of Churches United's new development director and her organization's campaign to raise funds for operating expenses as it serves the community's homeless population.

Violet Deilke, who sold the first winning ticket to the Travel Raffle, said her customer has chosen a trip to Hawaii. Cindy Nolte expressed her appreciation for President Dave, who arrives early every week to set up the meeting room and prepare to sell weekly raffle tickets. Dr. Johnson explains progress in treating common eye diseases and saving vision

Rotarian of the Day Jean Hannig introduced Dr. Max Johnson, who established his Retina Consultants more than 35 years ago. A native of Fargo, Johnson originally went into pharmacy before going back to medical school. He chose the subspecialty of retinology, "not a profession we advertise" — treating the layer at the back of the eyeball containing cells that are sensitive to light and that trigger nerve impulses that pass via the optic nerve to the brain. "We don't correct your vision," he explained. "Now we can save it. "When I first came back to practice, there was next to nothing we could do to treat diabetic retinopathy and macular degeneration," he said, referring to two diseases common among older adults that gradually lead to blindness. "We couldn't save your vision. Now, thanks to new medications, we can preserve your current vision and, even more importantly, help maintain your personal independence."

Diabetic eye disease affects 10.8% of the U.S. population; it's the leading cause of blindness in people from 45 to 64. Macular degeneration, on the other hand, is the number one cause of vision loss in those 55 and older. Vision changes over time, becoming blurred in the center of the field of vision.

Two forms of macular degeneration affect vision. The more aggressive one is wet AMD, in which blood vessels lead between layers at the back of the eye, resulting in scarring. Thirty years ago, he said,micro laser treatment was the only partially successful option.

Starting in 2010, however, intraocular injections of new medicines including Avastin, Lucentis and Eyelea have enabled retinologists to seal off bleeding in the retina layer at the back of the eye,

Johnson predicted similar progress will soon be available to help those with dry macular degeneration through intravitreal treatment: "It should minimize scarring, stabilize the eye and help you keep your vision."
