First monthly winners of 2022-23 Travel Give-Away announced with fanfare

President Dave Sederquist's snare drum was back on Nov. 1 to build excitement for the first announcement of winners in Moorhead Rotary's 2022-23 Travel Give-Away raffle.

Committee chair Dale Hetland announced that 398 tickets — of a total of 400 — were sold in the club's major fund-raiser this year, generating about \$15,000 of profit that will be used to support Rotary's good works. This year's top ticket sellers were Bill Woods, 8; Jerry Rogers, Emily Gess and Teresa Joppa, 10 each; Bob Hanna, 12; Jean Hannig, 52; and Violet Deilke, who single-handedly sold a total of 86 chances on the eight trips to be awarded.

It was fitting, perhaps, that she sold a ticket to November's winner of the top prize, William Lewis of Pelican Rapids. Lindsey Mack received the second place award of \$200 cash. Third place, a \$100 dining certificate to Rustica, was won by Anne Kaese of Fargo, who bought her ticket from Ernie Simmons.

Dave told members that the board is looking for ways to spend our charitable funds to achieve the greatest impact in the community. Suggestions, he said, should be shared with the review committee.

Noltes present a primer on Rotary Foundation's history, work & support

As Rotarian of the day, Jerry Rogers introduced two speakers who needed no introduction, long-time Rotarians Gary and Cindy Nolte. Gary is a past president and district governor; since his terms, he has been active around the district and much of the U.S. carrying the message of Polio Plus. Both he and Cindy have taken part in vaccination missions around the world.

The Rotary Foundation began in 1917, Gary said, when "26 dollars and some cents" was left over after the first convention. The Foundation is now worth more than one billion dollars. Charity Navigator, an international watchdog group that rates philanthropic organizations, gives it a 5— "the best you can get," he pointed out.

The international organization funds peace education and a variety of health initiatives, including clean water, like the project we recently sponsored in Tajikistan. It promotes educating girls and women and supports environmental efforts. And of course there's Polio Plus.

In District 5580, \$15 of each member's dues funds world mission projects — a fund Gary established during his term as governor 24 years ago.
