Horticulturist Don Kinzler offers advice on fall care of lawns, trees & perennials

Kinzler answers questions about how to ready yards for the coming winter

Rotarian of the Day Dale Hetland introduced Don Kinzler, the NDSU extension horticulturist whose columns and advice appear in The Forum every Saturday.

Don noted that the cooler temperatures expected in coming weeks help with fall color and the ripening of apples. He noted, however, that the seeding date for grass has passed; Sept. 15 is considered the deadline.



Lawns, however, do need help to recover from the summer's severe drought. He recommended fertilizing now, then watering the lawn well until the ground freezes. This is also the best time to control weeds, he said.

While he recommends setting mowers to a height of no less than 3 inches for the rest of the year, he said the blade can be set to 1.5 inches for the final mowing ... "not just yet, though," he cautioned. He recommends mulching fallen leaves instead of raking and removing them. "They provide good nutrients," he explained, "conserve moisture, reduce weeds and provide a natural compost."

He urged homeowners to continue watering their trees and shrubs. "They need a good soaking," he said. "The soil is still very dry a foot down." Half the watering should be at the drip line.

Evergreens, too, need to be hydrated. "Don't wait. Do it now," the expert emphasized.

He suggested tree guards for the first five years of newly planted shade through the winter. They should be removed in spring. He recommended paper wrap be used to protect apple trees, which are especially susceptible to sun scald.
