Roads: Work realized in 2010

Our roadconstruction department is working in following areas: opening and improvement of roads, construction and improvement of airstrips for planes, and infrastructure involving the use of heavy machinery.

In 2010, they realized following projects:

Project No. 35. Opening of a 7 km. road "Tojra Collo - Totoral" in the Municipality of Cuchumuela-Cochabamba.

Project No. 36. in the Municipality of Acasio, Province Bilbao, Potosi: Cleaning 45 km of roads:

Butuslaca - Taconi Bilbao (15 km.)

Llallaguani - Villque (7 km.)

Wayranas - Lick (14 km.)


Siquira Khasa - Piarani (9 km.)

Trenching:

For rollerbump and gabions in Tuquiza and Yanay Grande.

Project No. 37 Opening of a 13.5 km road Laja - La Joya in the Municipality of Mojocoya - Zudañez - Chuquisaca, which has a Health Center built by Mano a Mano Bolivia.

Other community work was the excavation of 3.5 km of sanitary sewer trench in the community of Pucara, Colomi Cbba




The communities have been waiting for more than two generations for the road from Laja to La Joya. Previously they only had a road in a riverbed through a canyon, usable only occasionally for 7 months of the year, and very precarious when passable.


Inauguration of the road Laja - La Joya

We started our trip on Sunday, December 5th, in the afternoon. The director, Dr. Velasquez took us safely to Sucre, where we had dinner and continued afterwards to Redención Pampa.

The trip from Sucre to Redención Pampa normally takes about 3hours, but the first heavy rain of the season had just fallen, so we had to travel carefully, as there were landslides and a lot of mud on the road. About 5 hours later we arrived at our destination.

During the trip, Mano a Mano Bolivia (MMB) showed that they are not only willing to support the construction of roads, health centers, and schools, but that they also will help others at any time they can. With the 4x4 of MMB, they towed out vehicles that were stuck in the mud.

The next day we continued our way to La Joya for the inauguration of the new road






Travelling in Bolivia always fills me with wonder at the beautiful nature and diversity here. The road went uphill until we had the clouds at our side and the valley far below. We stopped a moment to admire this wonder, and at the same time we could see road No. 37, which we were on our way to inaugurate, on another mountain in front of us. Very impressive.

On our way, we passed through Quivale, where we did the inspection of the current health center, because they requested MMB to build a new one.

We found the current health center in very poor condition, with little space, without a delivery room, and without basic services. We were convinced of the need of a new health center. After an interview with the nurse and some people of the community, we continued to Laja, where the new road starts.

It's almost unbelievable how they could build a path up this mountain. During the descent from 3000m to 1500 m, over a distance of 13.5km, I realized that it must have been very hard work. Arriving at La Joya, filled me with even more joy, because I could see the benefit of this road for the people who live there.

La Joya is a poor community, without electricity and where access to the village previously depended of the level of the river. Thanks to MMB there is now a continuous connection to Laja that provides year round access for an ambulance, and moreover they can use the road to transport their agricultural products.

CONSTRUCTION OF THE HEALTH CENTERS COPACHUNCHO Y TIKA PAMPA


The communities Copachuncho and Tika Pampa are in the municipality Totora, in Cochabamba, located 155 and 170 km, respectively, from the capital. This area is a flat, windy valley, and its economy is based on agriculture products like corn, wheat, barley, beans and potatoes.

Both communities had shortcomings in health services, especially in infrastructure, and they did not have suitable clinics or health centers. Because of this, the peoples and leaders of the communities presented a request to Mano a Mano Bolivia for consideration, in 2004 in the case of Copachuncho, and in 2007 of TikaPampa. In March of 2010, Mano a Mano made a commitment to work on both health centers in this same area, they would be the main financier for both projects. They started construction in July, finishing all construction work in October of that year. Because the two projects were in the same municipality, there was a spirit of healthy competition between the two communities, trying to finish one clinic before the other community. As a result of this competitive spirit, more local people contributed to the projects.

During the construction of both buildings, there was no lack of assistants. Everyone worked with a lot of responsibility and commitment, all with the goal to have a new, adequate, and functional health infrastructure.

Once the construction was finished, volunteers from Mano a Mano Bolivia and Mano a Mano USA helped set up the equipment. Included in the equipment was a dental chair and an examination table in each of the centers. The new centers were inaugurated on October 13 and October 25, 2010 respectively. The community showed their appreciation and gratitude through musical acts, and presented gifts and traditional food to all attendees.





Health days, an opportunity to help our neighbours



In the community Asuta in Beni, when I extracted a womans tooth, she grabbed my hands and said: "Thank you very much, God bless you! I have had pain for 3 months."

I understood then that there are still places that have never seen a dentist, where you cannot communicate without a translator, where people still live in "subhuman" conditions, and where you can only take care of patients sitting on stones or on a simple chair, just looking for the most comfortable position to receive medical attention.

I learned that it's not necessary that they pay you with money, but that a blessing is sufficient. I know that through my work I am helping my neighbours. I want to thank Mano a Mano Bolivia for giving me the opportunity to reach people who most need it in remote communities. I know we could still do more for people if we had portable orthodonic equipment, and were able to perform oral rehabilitations. But even now, with the equipment we have, we are making an improvement in the oral health of the people in these forgotten communities.
