The Week in Review -

Gil Sparks introduced our speaker, DAVID OLSON, Chief Executive Officer at Columbia Valley Community Health (CVCH). David presented the past, present and future of the role that CVCH plays in North Central Washington.

CVCH is a group of people who committed to the mission of providing access to improved health and wellness with compassion and respect for all.

CVCH began in 1972 in a small space, serving Chelan, Douglas, Grant and Okanogan County for a total of 10,000 square miles. Grant and Okanagan eventually spun off to create their own patient centered medical home to provide services needed to anyone who needs it. By law, more than 50% of board members must be patients.

In 2016, CVCH received 113,000 visits plus an additional 50,000 patients receiving prescriptions

81% of revenue comes from providing care. 18% income from state and fed government grants which has reduced significantly due to Obama Care.

Today, CVCH has several locations including a new facility opening in 4 weeks in Chelan which will double capacity. Future will bring a great deal of growth for CVCH. Plans include adding services to pediatric and seniors. Currently, 20% of the population are above the age of 65, which make up 5% of patients. The plan is to increase care for seniors by 20% per year. Another area to address is substance abuse (70% of inmates are there because of substance abuse), additional support for school districts and employer based services to take medical care to the place of work.

Changes are occurring in the way health care is paid for. Historically, fee for service incentivized providers to see patients as many times as possible. The new structure is based on value and quality. If the outcome does not show that a patient is getting better, the provider is at risk of not being paid. By 2020, 90% of Medicare and other insurance plans will be on a value base or a risk contract. The goal is to take care of people, make them better and control costs.

To do this, WA state has formed Accountable Community of Health (ACH). Our ACH covers Chelan, Douglas, Grant and Okanogan counties to work together to include a holistic approach to health by integrating medical, physical, behavior, substance abuse and social issues to improve care and decrease costs. 5% of the population accounts for 50% of all health care dollars spent in the US. Focusing on wellness and prevention is the the biggest opportunity for cost savings.

Dr. David Olson is excited about the future. Incentivizing providers to be involved in their community to provide quality care.

NEW-MEMBER PROPOSAL PROCESS

1. Potential new member identification

- Rotarian proposer (sponsor) identifies potential new member OR

Potential new member indicates interest through a sponsor OR
Proposal may come from another club for a transfer if in good standing

- Proposals should be kept confidential until approval by Board of Directors (BOD)

2. Conversation, Q&A, prospective member attends club meetings with sponsor

3. When a desire to join is confirmed:

- Fill out New-Member Proposal form (from secretary or down-load from web site)

- Personal info, including past Rotary affiliation (with member #)

- Discuss interests and potential classification

- Proposal delivered to club secretary

4. Secretary submits proposal to BOD for approval (at a meeting or via email)

5. BOD approves or disapproves within 30 days (at a meeting or via email). If approved ...

- Potential new member info published (posted in Appleseed and/or web site)

- If no objections* within 7 days, proposal is confirmed upon payment of admission fee

Sponsor explains costs as set by the BOD, currently ...

- \$95 admission fee paid before joining

- \$210 dues per 6 months (1/2 if under age 35) paid in June and December

6. President and/or sponsor will arrange for orientation and induction of the new member, and provide literature and ID badge. The secretary will assist as needed, including registering the member into the club/International data base and notifying the club treasurer.

Sponsor and/or chosen mentor should conduct in depth orienta-

It should include another Rotarian and be accomplished within 30 days. Hopefully this outline will clarify what has sometimes been a murky process and will help to encourage and expedite recruitment and club-building. A key ingredient is to make new recruits feel welcome, needed, and ready to get involved.
