Object of Rotary

- 1 - The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service
- 2 - High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society
- 3 - The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life
- 4 - The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service

Four Way Test

A Global Network of Community Volunteers

Started in 1905 - First Club - Chicago, IL

Paul Harris, lawyer, first president of Rotary International; (was never a club president)

Rotation among the offices of first members, thus the name Rotary

First Rotary service project - Public restroom

Club #2, San Francisco, 1908; and Club #4 formed in Seattle in 1909!

World Headquarters, Evanston, Illinois

Rotary International President: Ian H.S. Riseley – Rotary Club of Sandringham, Victoria, Australia.

Rotary Foundation

The mission of the Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty.

Paul Harris Fellows: A contribution to the Rotary Foundation of \$1000 permits a member or someone outside of the club to be honored as a Paul Harris Fellow.

Rotary Foundation Sustaining Members (Paul Harris Sustaining Member) is someone who makes a minimum gift of \$100 per year to the Rotary Foundation. When \$1000 is reached, the person is named a Paul Harris Fellow.
