The Scholarship committee gives awards in two categories; academics and nursing. In 2018 there were 5 applicants for 5 nursing awards - all applicants were given an award. The situation for the academic scholarships was different, 8 awardees were selected from 21 applicants.

As an example of the caliber of student that receives a scholarship, one of last year's awardees was



ranked first in their class of 520, has a 4.0 grade-point average, scored 1,580 out of 1,600 on their SAT and was Harvard-bound. All of this was on top of actively volunteering in various ways in the community.

Joan read a thank-you letter from a previous awardee, Victoria Hilder. After graduating from Hanford High school in 2012, Victoria had only part of the funds necessary for her first year at the University of Washington. Coupled with her own funds, the money that she received from Richland Rotary allowed her to complete her first year. She graduated in 2016 with two Bachelor's degrees, no debt and the offer of a full-time position in Anacortes. In her thank-you letter she enclosed a donation of \$1,000.

# Community Funded Projects Committee – Jan Griffin and Jerry McGuire (co-chairs)

The focus of this committee is to make the world a better place starting in the Tri-Cities by providing services for the most vulnerable people. To that end, this committee works with small agencies – the food bank, an agency that delivers coats to children at low-income public schools and many others.

They are also involved in projects that help keep kinds in school. Staying in school is a big indicator of future success. A summer camp for foster children in Spokane has been a repeat-beneficiary of funds from

this committee. This camp provides what so many of us take for granted, a safe place for children to play, learn and grow and enjoy some of the more special moments of life. Some foster children have never had a birthday party and the camp addresses this with a group birthday party for every child at the camp. Everyone in the club is encouraged to make suggestions of potential recipients of funds

from this group, however please do not suggest that everyone that gives a presentation at Rotary is automatically to receive funds for their projects.

# Works Project Committee – Mike Sinclair and Pat Hollick (not present) (co-chairs)

This committee focuses on getting Rotarians hands dirty on projects. They were in charge of last year's successful beach project in Richland (reminder – the whole Club is going to have a group picture at the beach at 4 PM on Tuesday, January 29) and have also been working in cooperation with the organization 'Rebuilding Mid-Columbia'.

Last year, the Club and Rebuilding Mid-Columbia worked together to build a ramp at the home of a man anticipating the long-term recovery from an upcoming liver transplant surgery.

# World Community Services Committee – Steven Arneson (Chair)

Through this committee, our club has assisted with work in other countries, mostly in Africa and Southeast Asia. This is easier in some places that in others. For example, in Southeast Asia although many people live on less than \$1/day, a thin veneer of business owners, doctors, lawyers, etc. are in a very different economic situation. This, coupled with a strong interest in philanthropy, leads to a way to have a significant impact on community







#### projects.

In Africa this has not been the case, a situation which leads to its own set of challenges. Every project pursued by this committee must have a cost of at least \$30,000. Richland has been, and continues to be, a part of several international projects including one in Africa focused on clean water, one that addresses the needs of children with cancer in India and one that provides sanitary supplies for young women in Kenya.
