Program

Stan introduced our own Dr. Rick Schulte, who filled in with little notice when the regular speaker could not make it. Rick, the Richland School District Superintendent, spoke off the cuff about the Richland Schools and the effects of recent State and Federal Legislation. He started off mentioning the schools levy coming up February 9. This is the renewal of the school budget that has to be done every two years, and covers the 2017 and 2018 budgets. Please vote to support the levy.

Rick tells us that Richland is a growing district. They added 500 students in the past year, for a total of over 13,000 students. They have



recently added 35 new classrooms and 13 new teachers and all day kindergarten. The new Orchard Elementary School is already filled and they are rebuilding to expand Marcus Whitman (Jefferson is next). It won't be long before they need a third comprehensive high school, and the district is looking at possible locations where they can get 50 to 60 acres of land for a school.

The legislative item that is changing the schools in Washington is the McCleary Decision. In January 2012, the Washington State Supreme Court ruled unanimously that the State of Washington is violating the constitutional rights of children by failing to live up to its "paramount duty" to amply fund

the education of all K-12 students. The Court ordered the Legislature to make steady, real and measurable progress each year and to fully fund K-12 public education by 2018. The McCleary decision says the state should be paying for basic education expenses and forces them to provide more funding. This can be used to hire teachers to reduce class size and support all day kindergarten across the State. Richland has used some of these extra funds to hire the teachers noted previously. Soon the local levy, currently used for basic education, will be available for enhancements instead. Basic education is determined by a complex formula and involves computation of numbers of teachers, classrooms. counselors, etc that a district requires.

This also affects teacher pay and will result in raises for most teachers, especially the newer ones. The state is in the process of overhauling the way teachers are rated for pay increases. The new system will not just measure education credits and longevity, but have alternative measures of accomplishment.

Last year the US Congress voted in a new program to replace No Child Left Behind. It is called Every Student Succeeds. There is still

mandatory testing of students, but it is not as extensive and the States get to decide what tests to use. Under the previous system, if any students didn't make the measures, the whole school was listed as failing, so virtually every school in the country was failing. Rick sees this as an improvement over the older system, and noted Washington Senator Patty Murray was one of those primarily responsible for the passage.

In other news, the District has a laptop purchase program for about 1000 computers per year. They are buying computers without internal memory, instead it is all cloud-based, so they only cost about \$300 each. They have different programs now for textbooks as rapid changes mean you have to replace them more often, so they used much more computer based instructional materials.
