Program

Steve Arneson was standing in for Stan today and introduced our speaker, Bob Hammond, the Energy Services Director for the City of Richland. Previously Hammond was the City Manager for Kennewick and held other positions in Kennewick managing utilities. He is a licensed Civil Engineer and came to this area originally to work at the Columbia generating station.

Hammond opened the talk with some information about the city and area. The electrical utility district was formed about 1959 with equipment inherited from the AEC. They still have some vintage equipment from 1948. There are currently about 23,500 electric customers. When



they reach 25,000 there are some additional requirements that kick in for renewable energy and conservation measures. The system has 552 miles of primary line, eight electrical substations and 56.5 staff members. Residential use makes up 89.5% of the electrical use. Power is purchased from

the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) under an agreement that will expire in 2028. Most of the power comes from the hydroelectric system.

The Energy Services office has separate accounting from the rest of the City. The fees charged are to cover the cost of the power purchased (67% of the budget), personnel, equipment and so on. They are guided by the Richland Utility Advisory Committee. The Committee includes several Richland Rotary members, Steve Arneson, Roy Keck, Dave Larkin and Ed Revelle. They help in policy and planning for Richland utilities.

Each year Energy Services does a Cost of Service analysis to see if the existing rates are adequate to cover the expected costs. They also did the first five-year projection in 2014. They had to do a rate increase in mid 2015 to help cover a three million deficit. The remaining deficit was covered by reserves. The next rate hike, about 9%, is tentatively set for July 2017, but could be reduced or put off as expenses are below predictions right now.

Hammond says the work can be challenging and includes a remarkable number of outages caused by squirrels. A couple of his photos included squirrel guards to keep them from off of the lines. He added they have a good technical staff and good planning and use of technology. The challenges ahead include recruiting and training workers to keep up with predicted retirement loses and improving project management. They are also working toward smart grid technology.
