Program

Steve Arneson filled in again for the missing Stan Jones. He introduce Tom Huntington, Chief of the Richland Fire Department. Mr. Huntington took over as Fire Chief last February, previously serving as a Battalion Chief. He has a degree in Fire Safety. He did not know until yesterday he was supposed to speak today and apologized for not having a presentation.

The Richland Fire and Emergency Services Department has four fire stations on GW Way, Jadwin Avenue, Keene Road at Gage, and the newest station on Duportail Road at Queensgate. When he started at Station 2, he said there were few calls, they played board games and made big meals. Things have changed and the Duportail station is on track to do 1100 to 1200 calls in its first year. In all, the four stations responded to 6300 calls in 2015, and that could increase by about 1000 per year in the future. This includes fire, rescue, HAZMAT and water rescue. They are working on a two-prong approach to the expanding needs for services by the community, They are doing the traditional fire and rescue services and doing outreach and education to reduce calls to 911 that could be handled in other ways. This included fire prevention, fall prevention and ways to reduce medical calls better handled elsewhere. One of the department challenges is that in the past 2-1/2 years they have had

2/3 of the firemen retire or transfer and 1/2 of the senior staff has also retired. This is a tremendous change in personnel and loss of experience. They are trying to do more in succession planning for future waves of retirements. On the plus side there are some new ideas and new energy in the current staff. New staff requires 12 to 13 weeks of training to be state certified and another two weeks in their stations before they are able to join a crew. Station 4, at Duportail Road, was commissioned last July. The city won a national award for the design. This contrast to Station 2 on Jadwin, that they keep fixing up (Huntington referred to it as the pig in lipstick), but it is too small, too old and worst, in the wrong place.



In future plans, the department is working on building an organization that is community driven and outcome oriented. They are looking at alternatives to being gunded only from the city general fund, where they compete with roads, schools and other priorities. One big plus for the area is the level of cooperation and coordination with other jurisdictions. They have agreements with the other cities and with Benton, Franklin and Walla Walla counties. In fact, an FAA inspector looking over response planning for the Tri-Cities airport, said this area had the best coordination of resources he had ever seen. They also coordinate with the DOE crews at the site. When asked, he said the response to a house fire would include five trucks, a command vehicle and an ambulance. A fire in a business would include more.

Ian Napier complimented the fire department for the response to a small fire at the hotel a couple of years ago. He said they acted quickly and prevented a big problem from developing.

A fire started on some grassland near a farm in Indiana. The fire department from a nearby town was called to put the fire out. The fire proved to be more than the small town fire department could handle, so someone suggested that a rural volunteer fire department be called. Though there was doubt they would be of any assistance, the call was made.
