Program

Julie Funfar introduced the speakers today, Carol Larkin and Stan Moon with RESULTS, Tri-Cities. Stan Moon started the program explaining that RESULTS is a movement of passionate, committed everyday people. Together they use their voices to influence political decisions that will bring an end to poverty.

The local effort started last August and involves six volunteers. To date they have had a meeting with Congressman Newhouse and another meeting with his staff and done several letters and other media pieces focusing on poverty and hunger.



RESULTS has two areas of focus, hunger in the United States, and Global Hunger and Education. In the US, there are about 800 volunteers in 100 communities. It was founded in 1980 by Sam Daley Harris.

Volunteers receive training, support, and inspiration to become skilled advocates. In time, volunteers learn to effectively advise policy makers, guiding them towards decisions that improve access to education, health, and economic opportunity for all. They become a voice for the marginalized and disadvantaged. These volunteers get involved and get educated then help educate legislators on the issues of hunger and poverty.

The training also includes assistance and material to use in meeting with local politicians to educate and encourage legislation to end poverty. They also advise on media items (articles, letters to the

editor, editorials, etc. with the aim of educating the public as well.

Stan gave some statistics: in the 2015 US census, 43.5 million people were listed as living in poverty. Almost 20% of children live in poverty in the US. We need stronger programs to increase government antipoverty funding. We need more aid for health and nutrition, and to increase economic mobility.

Carol Larkin began with some photos of a Central African Republic village, asking the group to imagine growing up there (except for Phillip who grew up in Kenya).

She said the US is a leader in aid to mothers and children. Since 1990 the mortality rate for children under five has been cut in half, largely due to US efforts. An example of one village where the aid group asked what were the biggest health concerns. They were the high rate of maternal death (5 to 6 women each

month), child under-nutrition and death rates for children under 5. At the time, most women gave birth at home and there were few trained people to help, and little education.

The Village leader decreed that all women should have babies at the health clinic, which was improved and given more staff. Now the maternal death rate is below one per 6 months. The new mothers get nutrition education, and baby care guidance.

RESULTS efforts on Global Poverty include:

Drawing on strong bipartisan support in Congress for effective health, nutrition, and education programs. They work throughout the budget and appropriations process to protect and increase this funding.

Working to support the reintroduction and passage of the Reach Every Mother and Child Act in 2017. The legislation would make ending preventable maternal and child deaths a priority for U.S. foreign assistance.

The Global Partnership for Education works to achieve a world in which every person experiences the power of a great education. It brings together partners worldwide to finance quality education plans in poor and conflict-affected countries. They would like to see a higher focus on education in poor areas and those with conflict. Unfortunately, the current administration is proposing a 28% cut in international funding for poverty and education programs.
