Rob McKenna, Washington State Attorney General

The speaker, highly articulate and not needful of notes, provided an update on imminent legislation, specifically the 11 bills now in process. Their common objective: to protect the consumer, to protect the public, and to monitor the accountability of government. Several examples ensued:

• Immigrants are victimized by scams, those professing immigration assistance. Practitioners without legal or other licenses have caused complications at times resulting in deportation or the threat of it. Some are notaries masquerading as lawyers. The victims have been out money and have had their situations worsened.



Legislation has been proposed to eliminate misleading titles and advertising by notaries.

• There are proposals targeting gang violence. He provided some frightful statistics as to the size of the problem, the increase in gang membership and crimes (i.e. drive-by shootings, and our state's high ranking in regard to this problem. There is a huge number of gangs in the northwest. The emphasis is now on recruiting children, very often for the purpose of carrying guns for those who cannot afford to be found in possession of them. Shootings usually involve young people. One proposal is to increase criminal penalties for gang leaders. This has been shelved for budgetary reasons. Another is to provide local communities with the necessary civil tools. Protective orders do much to de-escalate disorder by putting felons on watch and separating the victim from the criminal. It decreases recruitment and abates nuisance. It lowers the crime rate. This has been proven in Texas. Protective orders also evict gangs from property where they operate.

• Investment in prevention. Anti-gang bracelets are distributed in high-risk schools. There is also a need to divert kids away from recruitment, with boys and girls clubs, YMCAs, and the like. Too many kids go home to empty houses when both parents work. They cannot go to the parents' workplace due to child labor laws. A request for \$10M to implement this has also been shelved due to the budget. One suggestion has been to add \$5 to each traffic citation to help finance it.

• The costs of incarceration and of caring for drive-by shooting victims are extremely high. It is better to create the resources to prevent the occurrences.

He made the point that 60% of incarcerated convicts are there for violent crime. In Seattle the police triage property crime, due to its high prevalence. Only two members of the Seattle police force are there to investigate fraud, of which there is no scarcity.

In the question and answer period, AG McKenna discussed issues such as the Yucca Mountain litigation and the state employees' unions. He believes that we will prevail in locating the waste disposal site at Yucca Mountain. He believes that state employees have to be objectively evaluated and employed on the basis of performance. He feels that we cannot sustain ever-increasing salaries and benefits in the present economic climate.
