In the 2015 budget, Rose reported that the increase in spending was held to 3.5% over 2014, and done without tax increases. They





aim for stability and sustainability, but find the revenue is not rising as quickly as the population. They are balancing current needs and anticipating future requirements to maintain good stewardship.

Cindy took over to discuss current projects. The new fire station at Duportail in the Queensgate area is due to be completed in late May to early June. They will be doing tours before it opens. It was done as a design build project and it is working out quite well. Cindy noted that placement of the fire stations are located in cooperation with other cities to best serve the area.

The highest priority project is the Duportail Bridge. It is in the State Transportation Plan and the City is working with the State on the \$38 million it will take to build. Another priority is the Waterfront Master Plan. The aim is to tie in various city areas like the Parkway and Swift corridor with the riverfront as distinct, but connected destinations. New restaurants are going in off Columbia Point as well as on Swift Boulevard.

Other projects include an electrical substation in the Dallas Road/Badger area to serve the growing area of south Richland. In north Richland, the emphasis in on the Revitalization Area for Industry, Science and Education (RAISE) that includes infrastructure improvements to serve developments like the new refrigerated warehouse and other businesses. The Port of Benton won a "Recruitment Project of the Year" Award for their RAISE work. This is a Local Revitalization Funding (LRF) project, so the Southridge project in Kennewick is not the only successful LRF project in the area, as a certain other Mayor recently claimed!

Cindy and Mayor Rose together made the point that the City is constantly reevaluating how they do business and want to hear from the residents. Cindy noted we could always beat up our members Pete Rogalsky (city planning) and Phil Lemley (city council) or contact her office. Everyone is encouraged to participate via comments, attending meetings or joining a board or commission. In response to questions the pair noted there was a plan in the next few years to look at moving or rebuilding the City offices. They are looking for a new site and tying it to redevelopment plans. They also noted the proposed Public Market on George Washington Way was not quite as described in the paper. It would include a study for a public market, but start with a café and office space. They are starting work now on a performing arts stage at John Dam Plaza.
