was able to find a home last week in Tucson for her upcoming retirement. David Chavey-Reynaud reminded the group of Emerging Tri-Cities, a volunteer symposium coming up on Friday, trying to engage younger citizens in community development. Bob Larson was in Washington D.C. recently for the meeting of the Waterway Association. Ian then went through a short guiz of guestions related to the Pacific Northwest, including an alternate name for PNW (Cascadia), founder of Seattle (Captain Vancouver), another name for Mt. Rainier (Tacoma), location of the Silicon Forest (near Portland), name of modern era music from PNW (Grunge or Indie).

Program

Chris Meiers introduced today's speaker, Ms. Pat Lacey, from the Kadlec Neurological Resource Center (KRNC). Pat is a nurse who retired 4 vears ago after 44 years of service, and who serves as a board member for the KNRC and the Kadlec Foundation. She was here with Cathy Manderbrach, one of the 2.5 person staff, but she was speaking as a volunteer who was passionate about the work of the Resource Center. She said that the center was started in part with a grant from Battelle, and support from the 3 hospitals, and it has transitioned to be supported by Kadlec, who pay the salary costs of the employees, and fundraising done by the Center.

In April 2014, the Center relocated to its current home in the Kadlec Healthplex, which contains a library of comprehensive resources on a wide

range of neurological disorders. The Healthplex also has classrooms for the many educational programs and support groups that are part of the KRNC's mission. The library is a true lending library, so materials are free to be checked out by patients or caregivers on neurological disorders and healthy living topics. There is also a special section for children. Support groups are available for ALS, Parkinson's, Stroke, Spinal Disorders, chronic pain, Alzheimer's, MS and more recently, a Young Adult group, adding up to about 18 group meetings in any given month. So if you know of someone with these diagnoses, or a caregiver involved with a patient newly diagnosed with one of these disorders, then KNRC is a great place to start in managing your illness.

Pat noted that 21% of the population are caregivers, and with a population of 280,000 in the Tri-cities; Benton and Franklin County, there are a lot of affected people; patients struggling with a diagnosis and treatment, or a caregiver involved in their care. Pat said the Center also sponsors educational events that

They have started the HEAD SMART event, focused on middle school aged student activities and steps that can be taken to protect their developing brain. Their goal in 2017 is to spread the word and get more people acquainted with the services of the Kadlec Neurological Resource Center, to reach more patients and families and support them in their neurological care.
