Judge Jeanne Dillner

Jeanne started off giving three cheers for the Kadlec hospital staff. She had back surgery just 2 weeks ago and was very happy with her care and progress. She asked what good things were happening for us? Diahann Howard said her niece just had a lovely, big baby girl. I guess this means Diahann is not just a good aunt, but now a Great Aunt! Jan Griffin put in for her alma mater Syracuse making it in the NCAA Final Four. Dick Richter (who's company is the builder) put in for comments from Red Lion that the test of the new stage across the street rattled the hotel windows. He said to prepare, as the grand opening on April 9 will really shake things. Pete Rogalski added something for his NCAA team, Gonzaga, who was eliminated but fought hard.



Jim Bauer was happy about selling several items at his place, including a goat, but still has a motor home for sale. Linda Gilmore was happy all three of her kids were home for Easter! Chris Smith talked about a 100 mile run and also talked about how rewarding it was to be involved with Junior Achievement. Visitor Josh Chittenden also works with Junior Achievement and said their recent bowling fund raiser brought in \$310,000. Several of our Rotarians volunteered time at the bowl a thon. Larry Christensen and his wife are going on a 15-day cruise.

Program

Stan introduced the speaker, our own C. Mark Smith. He was the stand in for someone from the American Queen Steamboat Company, which runs the paddle wheel cruises up the Columbia River. Mark knows them well, as he has been a volunteer docent for the Richland area stops by the cruise ship American Empress. This is the largest river cruise ship in the northwest and can carry over 200 passengers and about 80 crew members. The American Steamboat Company also runs another ship, the American Queen, on the Mississippi River. There are two other companies with Columbia River cruises and three other ships that make stops in the area.



The Empress accommodations are very luxurious, with premium staterooms, dining rooms and facilities. The trip includes all meals with drinks, and on-board talks on history, geology and other features of the trip plus evening shows. The food is locally sourced and rated highly. Former cruise ship host Ian Napier got a tour of the American Empress last year and said he was very impressed. All of this care and premium facilities come at a premium cost. Mark says the staterooms start at \$3200 per person and go up to over \$6,000. Discounts on these prices can be found, especially early or late in the cruise season.

The cruises typically start in Portland, going down river first to Astoria, then turn upriver to Stevenson, The Dalles, Richland, and on to Clarkson, Idaho in 7 to 9 days. Other ships may make different stops. Each stop includes various tours. When the American Empress stops here, it is at the Amon Park dock. There are 12 volunteer docents that help with the local tours. The passengers can take local hop-on hop-off tours that make round trips to the Reach Center, Sacajawea Park and the Franklin County Historical Society Museum. There is also a self-guided walking tour of the Parkway in Richland. In addition, there are premium tours the passengers may take. These include a Red Mountain wine tour and one to Pendleton. They are adding a B Reactor tour to the list.

The economic impact of the tours, including the other riverboat tour companies, exceeded \$485,000 in 2015. There were more than 10,500 passengers visiting and spending time and money in the area.
