

Program

Julie Funfar introduced our speaker for the day Rich Cummins. Dr. Cummins has just left as the President of Columbia Basin College (CBC), a position he has held since 2008. He joined Columbia Basin College in 1990 as an English instructor. He has held many other positions including Vice President in his tenure there. He left to be Chancellor at Western Governors University (WGU) in Seattle. He noted he had been in the local Kiwanis Club for many years, but as it isn't very active in Seattle, he was joining a Rotary Club there on advice form a friend. A comment was heard that he was too young for Kiwanis!

Dr. Cummins came today to talk about CBC, WGU and post-high school education. He showed a graph that revealed that for the first time, the middle class of the US (defined as those earning 2/3 to 2 times the median income) is below 50% of the population. In 1971 61% of households were middle class and it has been declining. One reason for this is the need for greater level of education in the modern economy.

Another graph showed that for workers with a college degree there was no recession, but for those with just a high school education, there was, and also there has been no recovery. Of the 11.5 Million jobs created since 2008, 99% went to those with an education level above high



school. Only one percent went to lower education levels.

Honorary Members

The obvious thing is to grow middle skills jobs. Those jobs requiring more than a high school diploma, but less than a college degree. CBC is helping fill this need with many certificate programs for their students and local high school students. CBC is partnered with the school districts of Pasco, Richland and Kennewick on different programs with this aim. Nuevo Horizons in Pasco works with the alternative high school to be sure students can graduate not only with a diploma, but some certificate as well. The Health Sciences Academy and Wortman Center in Richland focus on health care education opportunities in concert with Kadlec. The newest effort is with Kennewick where they are breaking ground for a Culinary Arts education center.

CBC is forecast to grow at about 10% per year for the next several years and double in size in the next 20 years. It currently has 74 program areas offering degrees or credentials.

Dr. Cummins' new venture is the Western Governors University Washington. He will be Chancellor. WGU is an on-line university with programs from Bachelor to PhD in Teaching, Business, Health and Information Technology. It is focused on developing competencies and self-paced learning. Exams are used to evaluate and guide students to what they need to work on to gain the required competencies before they move on to the next course. When a student has passed a course, it is truly because he has mastered the subject matter.

The average time to achieve a degree at WGU is 2 ½ years instead of 4 to 5. Most students are adults (average age is 37) seeking to finish degrees who may be able to get through basic courses quickly to move on faster. There is a big need for schools to help adults with some college credits to get their degree or certifications without taking as much time.

As the program ended Pam Larsen spoke saying how much she appreciated his contributions to the community here and that he would be missed. President Dick came to the front and talked about how much our club appreciated those contributions within the community, as well as the time he had put in to aid us in setting up our nursing scholarships at CBC. In thank you, Dr. Cummins was

presented with a Paul Harris Award from the club. Dr. Cummins seemed quite moved. He said he knew what a Paul Harris was and what it represented and was very grateful for the honor.

Hals Humor
