# George Garlick

The title of his remarks was, "Building Integrity in Personal and Business Activity."

While illustrations of his tenets were many, the principles themselves were relatively few, pervasive, and basic to successful human relationships. These apply not exclusively to business, but to all the interactions that occur among and between us. His words invoked thoughts of such as The Golden Rule, The Four Way Test, Polonius/Laertes, and even some words by President Truman, to wit, "A man should not forget where he came from."

Quite obviously, the speaker has not forgotten where he came from, nor has he neglected it. One of his major points was that we must think of the other person's needs, pain, and preoccupations—and that we must not focus on ourselves. The leitmotif was unmistakable: There is Something More, something in the nature of a Fifth Dimension, behind everything.



We must know how to help those with whom we deal. If we focus on others, there is a reward. The axioms, "We will never let you down." And "You can do anything you put your mind to, but you cannot do it alone," are illustrative of this philosophy.

He spoke of a near-death experience, the upshot of which, was, in his words," My life no longer belongs to me." Having been allowed to come back confirmed the imperative to think of others. He believes that businesses fail because they lose focus. It is more than implied that this focus is on "the other fellow."
