Program

Pam Larsen-Brown introduced the speaker today, Kevin Smith, manager of the Department of Energy Office of River Protection (ORP). Smith is a native of Olympia, Washington and is a graduate of the Air Force Academy with a bachelor's degree in physics. He also holds a bachelor's in mathematics and a master's of science degree in management. In addition to being an F-16 Fighter pilot, a Squadron commander and commander in the Air Force, he flew the F-4 and the F-117 Stealth Fighter. Smith also held various leadership positions in the Department of Defense before joining the Department of Energy. His last position before



coming here in 2012 was in management of the Los Alamos lab in New Mexico.

The DOE Office of River Protection (ORP) was formed in 1999 when work to empty and treat the radioactive waste in 177 underground tanks was split off from DOE's Richland Operations Office. The Office of River Protection is responsible for DOE's most complex environmental cleanup project. They are responsible for the underground tanks containing various wastes, and the construction of the Vitrification plant for the treatment of the waste. There are about 225 employees, both government and contractor. The major contractors are Bechtel, Wastren Advantage, Inc and Washington River Protection Solutions, Inc, and a budget of about 1.2 billion dollars per year.

The Vision Statement for ORP is "To be a high-performing, innovative organization that is safety-conscious and employee-focused, and committed to achieving our mission with environmental and fiscal responsibility."

One area of work is the emptying of older and leaking, mainly single walled, tanks at various tank farms at the Hanford site. The tanks range in size from 55,000 gallons to one million gallons. They contain various materials, typically combinations of soluble and insoluble salts that are radioactive. There may be crusts of solid material on the surface and heavy sludge at the bottom. There is an estimate 53 million gallons of waste.

The existing system is very cumbersome and inefficient. For the next tank farm they are working on more efficient strategies and have seen a 34% improvement over the old system, as they move material out of the old tanks into double-walled containment.

The waste must be safely stored until the treatment can begin. The DOE is building the world's largest radioactive waste treatment plant. The Hanford Waste Treatment and Immobilization Plant (WTP), also known as the "Vit Plant," will use vitrification to immobilize most of Hanford's waste. Vitrification involves blending the waste with glass-forming materials, and heating it to high temperature to form molten glass, then pouring it into stainless steel canisters. In this glass form, its radioactivity will dissipate over hundreds to thousands of years while it is safely stored. The plant contains various structures for pretreatment, low level waste and high-level waste. The plant was started in 2002 and has been designed as it is being built. Under the proposed Consent Decree changes, construction will continue in various parts into 2039. The hold up is over many technical issues involved in the handling and treatment. It is a massive undertaking and there is nothing of this scale anywhere in the world.

The original agreement was to start treating waste by 2022 and DOE plans to try and meet that by focusing on the low-level waste that will not require pretreatment and treat that first. Once the plant is fully operational, it will have the capacity to treat large amounts of waste each year.

Smith also provided some updates on tanks being emptied due to leakage. One tank, AY-102 started being pumped March 3 and is now below the level of the leak. They are also removing material from the annular space in this double-walled tank. He noted that due to radioactive decay, the tanks are typically about 130 degrees inside. In this tank the volume of material is low and the temperature is going down.

DOE is also looking for any technologies that might help. They held a competition and got 44 entries, of which four were funded to investigate further. In addition they are working with WSU and Energy Solutions on a mixing technology. For employee safety they are working with PNNL on

improved engineering controls to create a safer environment for work rather the current reliance on protective equipment and administrative controls (such as restricting access).
