Tom started with his own father, who dropped out of medical school to join the Air Force, much to the distress of Tom's grandmother. Jan Jackson reported his father in law was an Army Sergeant-Major and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. Gordon Bopp said his wife's cousin went ashore in the first assault on the island of Tarawa, was wounded by a mortar and lay on the beach for hours before getting treated. Larry Lowry's dad was in the 82nd Airborne and made a night glider landing during the D-Day invasion. The glider hit a post and was cut in half, but he was ok. Rick Schulte's dad was awarded a Bronze Star for his combat service.









Program

Gordon Bopp introduced the speaker Ms. Colleen French of the Department of Energy. Ms. French is the National Park Program Manager for the local portion of the new Manhattan Project National Park for the Department of Energy (DOE).

The new park, authorized in the latest Defense Budget, encompasses three widely separated sites: Hanford, Los Alamos, New Mexico and the Oak Ridge Tennessee facilities. Ms. French is part a team from the National Park Service (NPS) and DOE that is visiting the sites and preparing to write an evaluation. The team has already been to Oak Ridge and Hanford, and will travel soon to White Sands. She said the Team was very impressed with our area, the B Reactor, site access, infrastructure and especially the community support.



Goals for the National Park are:

- Preserving and protecting significant resources
- Improving the public understanding of the Manhattan Project
- Enhancing public access and
- Assisting the DOE, historical groups and other involved parties to tell their stories.



The Secretary of the Interior, with input from DOE will decide where the Park headquarters will be located, and what parts will be included for public view. The B Reactor is automatically included, but will need some work for access and safety, including a new roof. Locally DOE is evaluating other portions of the Hanford site for inclusion.

These are:

- The T Plant where spent fuel was processed. This is unlikely to be included due to the continuing clean-up work and possible use of the site.
- Bruggeman Warehouse is the remains of a homestead and farm established in 1912. It is likely to be included, and might make a good location for the visitor's center.
- Allord Pump House, 1908, that was the first irrigation system in the State, and served 16,000 acres. DOE would like to see it included.
- The White Bluff Bank from 1907 will be restored to its original condition. It is very likely to be included and used to show exhibits about the communities that were displaced in 1942.
- Hanford High School dates to 1916 and was built of reinforced concrete, unusual for the time.
 It too will likely be restored and tell the story of the local community and life along the river. It is eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Buildings.

Ms. French says this is a big effort and they have three years to figure out the basics and get some funding. The initial funding will go to the NPS, but DOE homes to get some to restore and make safe the buildings and sites. There will be a lot of public involvement and coordination going on. She said the B Reactor hosts about 10,000 visitors a year and is estimated to add about two million dollars to the local economy. The NPS told her they needed to be ready for 100,000 visitors or more!
