Dr. Moo-Young earned his PhD and Master of Science in Civil and Environmental Engineering from Renselaer Polytechnic Institute and a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from Morgan State University. A licensed professional engineer, his research interests include solid and hazardous waste management, environmental containment, remediation technologies, and is a member of national engineering and science organizations.



He noted that WSU is vibrant and strong, just completing a \$1 billion dollar capital campaign. The grade points of entering students average 3.2. Retention and graduation

rates are improving. Sixty-seven percent of students graduate within six years. Chancellor Moo-

Young said that WSU Tri-Cities is celebrating 25 years. He described their many accomplishments to date and, even more exciting, what they plan to accomplish in the years ahead. The current student body comes from 29 of 38 Washington counties, and from 12 states and 10 countries.

He spoke of the many challenges facing public universities. For example, WSU has lost two-thirds of their state funding within the past ten years. The state ranks 47th out of 50 in the percentage of its students attending college or university. He described the challenges in dealing with an increasingly-diversified student body, noting that 22 percent of all students in grades 2-12 in eastern Washington are Hispanic. He noted the importance of students' graduating once enrolled. Students who do not graduate translates into a decrease in the lifetime income and negative impact on our economy. A major focus for WSU is to tap into the potential for students to graduate, and stay in the Tri-Cities, and become long term contributors to the economy and wellbeing of our communities

Dr. Moo-Young said that WSU Tri-Cities is celebrating 25 years here. They pride themselves on what they've accomplished in that time but look forward to the even more exciting challenges that lie ahead. They pride themselves on being a research university, with students from 29 of 38 Washington counties, and 12 states and 10 countries. He spoke of the challenges facing public universities, including the percentage of high schools students going on to college and ability to graduate once enrolled. The loss of those students not graduating translates to a decrease in the lifetime income and negative impact on our economy. A major focus for WSU is to tap into the potential for students to graduate, and stay in the Tri-Cities, and become long term contributors to the economy and wellbeing of our communities. In order to deal with these issues, he said that WSU Tri-Cities seeks to improve its student experience by adding dormitories, a student center, expanding club sports, and perhaps adding a dock on land it owns along the Columbia River.

He outlined three major objectives he is pursuing: Turning the campus into a place that fosters student engagement; creating a dynamic research experience for the students; and promoting community engagement for student community service and connections to the business community. He discussed the current "Cougs in the Community" program where WSU students participate in a

community service project, and Dr. Moo-Young suggested that this could be advanced by one or more partnerships with Richland Rotary, knowing of the many projects Rotary promotes for our community.

In the big picture, he envisions WSU Tri-Cities as the State of Washington's Polytechnic campus, and highlighted existing programs such as enology and viticulture program at the Wine Science Center, Biofuels Research at BSEL, Waste cleanup and remediation at the new EnergySolutions laboratory, and fermentation and food sciences as examples of the emerging programs which give the campus strength now and even greater potential for future growth.
