Program

The program today was about climate change, the state of climate science, and related governmental policy. Our presenter was Steve Gahn of the Citizen's Climate Lobby. Steve is a climate scientist who earned his Ph.D. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He started out by walking us through a Rotary-style four-way test for climate change:

- 1. Is it the Truth?: Climate science is backed by extensive hard data. Over 97% of climate scientists from all over the world agree that anthropogenic climate change is real and poses a dire threat to life on this planet.
- 2. Is it Fair to All Concerned?: The weight of the greatest negative impacts of climate change will be borne by those least able to deal with them economically or politically. Mitigating climate change will nevertheless help both the haves and the have-nots.

- 3. Will it Build Goodwill and Better Friendships?: Working to slow and stop climate change can only be accomplished through a global goodwill effort by all stakeholders working together.
- 4. Will it be Beneficial to All Concerned?: Slowing climate change benefits all life on the planet now and in the future.

Steve noted that the economic damage of a 4 degree rise in global temperatures over the next 30 years will be equivalent to a 30% drop in GDP

According to Steve, Citizen's Climate Lobby is a non-partisan advocacy group with 400 chapters across the United States. Their mission is to build support in Congress for a national bipartisan solution to climate change.

The solution they currently feel is the most politically and economically feasible is known as Carbon Fee and Dividend. This would be a national, revenue-neutral carbon fee-and-dividend system, which would place a predictable, steadily rising price on carbon (imposed upstream on producers — as near as feasible to the mine, well, or port of entry), with all fees collected minus administrative costs returned to households as a monthly energy dividend.

According to Citizen's Climate Lobby, studies show that in just 20 years such a system could reduce carbon emissions to 50% of 1990 levels while adding 28 million jobs to the American economy.
