Preliminaries



Program

Stan Jones introduced today's speaker, Brent Geary, mayor of West Richland. Brent has spent almost 20 years on the City Council, and was elected mayor in 2014. He reminded the club that West Richland was incorporated as a city in 1955, before the City of Richland, and about 1/2 if its land currently is in undeveloped and agricultural usage. Current population is 14,360, up from 4000 residents about 20 years ago. In the past 5 years the population has increased about 3.5% per year, and the assessed valuation recently passed the \$1 billion mark. One of the biggest challenges for West Richland is the retail sales leakage as the city's sales tax revenue is the lowest in the Tri-Cities,

and much of the spending by West Richland residents occurs in Richland and Kennewick. There is also a lack of retail businesses. However, the population growth has increased municipal spending, so the city has been challenged to meet those demands with its current sources of revenue. He noted that you can't maintain a budget on building permits.

He reviewed the plans for development of the Belmont Business District, in the vicinity of Belmont and Keene roads. There was a recent ground breaking for the new Municipal Services Center there, and construction is underway on the new middle school, which is slated for



opening in 2017. The city received an IACC Energy Efficiency Award, and national recognition for its complete replacement of city lights with LED lighting, and reduction in electrical costs of more than 60%.

There has been construction of an Industrial Water Treatment Facility, which pretreats the effluent from wine production, before releasing it into the municipal sewer facility, and benefits the development of wineries in the Red Mountain area. Brent also outlined changes coming from improvements to the Yakima River Gateway, which will beautify the areas near the bridge, with new restrooms, pathways and an ADA compliant ramp.

Last, he said that review of the city's Comprehensive Plan had started, and there have been meetings to gather public input on the updated plan, so comments and suggestions are welcome. Mayor Geary said that while the City needs more development, especially of commercial and retail businesses, there is no desire to change the rural nature of the city. The hitching post outside of the current City hall will be moved to the new City complex when it is completed!
