David outlined the transit routes offered that cover 618 miles in Richland, Kennewick, Pasco, West Richland, Prosser, Benton City and some unincorporated areas of the county. The system begin in 1981 when voters approved a transit system supported by a portion of the sales tax revenue, and services are offered Monday through Friday and on the weekends, although there is no service on designated major holidays. There are the fixed bus schedules, which run on fixed, repetitive routes in the same continual loop. There is also a Dial-A-Ride is a program for Seniors and Disabled citizens that is based on eligibility screening, and whether a person cannot



use regular transit buses, or shared ride service. Fares are \$25/month or \$1.50 per trip. The Vanpool program is a shared ride service whose cost to participants is based on mileage, and the vans are maintained by Ben Franklin Transit. They also offer Taxi Feeder, which is a contracted service in which a taxi will take the rider to a Transit center, and connect them with the regular routes, used to connect people coming from outside the regular routes. For example, this is used to provide service from Finley.

They have extensive information on their website, with maps, timetables and contact numbers. Also, there are kiosks to access this same information at the transit centers, and Customer Service is available at 509-735-5100. On the website, there is an online trip planner that is linked to Google, so it looks up a route and outlines it from starting point to destination. Kevin said that a review of the Comprehensive Plan is underway, to determine changes and growth in the coming years. They are reviewing the whole system, traffic, ridership and use patterns. They are planning to pilot use of GPS on their buses, with automatic people counters, so in the future it would be possible to pinpoint the location of any bus, and use patterns could be better tracked to meet needs over time and offer the most effective services for our residents throughout our growing area.
