# Program – Benton County Recovery Coalition (BCRC)

Today's guests were from the Benton County Recover Coalition (for more information see <www.509recovery.org>. Chris Meiers introduced the President and founder, Dr. Michelle Gerber, who retired as a Historian from Hanford. Danielle Stenehjem was the co-speaker with Dr. Gerber and is on the Board of Directors. Danielle is Dr. Gerber's daughter, is a graduate student in addiction studies and is also training to become an EMT.

Dr. Gerber has several connections to Rotary and to our Club, in particular. She was the 2nd female member of Richland Rotary in 1989 (the year that the Rotary Council on Legislation voted to eliminate the requirement that membership be limited to men). Her father was president of the Richland Rotary Club in 1966 and her husband, Eric, is a past Richland Rotarian and a Paul Harris Fellow.

Dr. Gerber came to our club to talk about treating addiction as a disease and started by sharing how it had impacted her personally.

Two of her children developed an addiction. Her son died in 2014 when he was 36 years old and her daughter is in long-term recovery. Her son came to her for help. Multiple times over the years Dr. Gerber left on 2 hours notice to attend to her son, including leaving the work that she was doing for Governor Christine Gregoire.

He was smart – he went through a gifted program in Tri-Cities schools. He could also be erratic and manipulative. His positives were in spite of the disease. His negatives were due to his disease.

BCRC's goal of meeting with our Club today is to let us know what we need to know. Dr. Gerber graduated from SUNI in New York where she was taught that knowledge is power. It's important to know addiction. Our brain is an electrochemical machine and an addicted brain changes. Judgement is impaired. A person looks the same on the outside, but inside they are profoundly altered. Genetics plays a huge role. Dr. Gerber's husband took opiates for weeks after a ski accident and stopped with no problem. Others can take them only once and be addicted.

We need to treat addiction as a disease. You can't be admitted to the hospital due to this disease. No other disease is treated like this. It is not fair for individuals battling addition to disrupt society but we need to provide better treatment than the current norm.

The Board of Directors includes sheriffs and doctors and others. The BCRC has three major goals; to open a detox facility, to open an in-patient facility and to open a low level facility for folks. Folks admitted to the low level facility would be those that committed an offense and would stay there until they recovered. If they are unable to successfully complete recovery then charges against them comes back.

Danielle is the youngest person on the Board of Directors. She is impressed and thankful to see the organization go from 7 people on a back porch to over 100 in a year. Every 7.3 minutes one person dies of addiction. But, treating people as addicts that can't change won't work. Pushing them out of the hospital does not work and is not helpful. Charging them with crimes exacerbates the situation as they are often unable to handle the steps necessary to address the charges. The BCRC offers help. Individuals must be accountable for their actions but the individuals going through this must also get the benefit of treating addiction as a disease, not a disgrace. To this end local sheriffs have implemented a Medicated Assisted Treatment (MAT) program to help habitual users. Individuals in the program are dosed by doctors to mitigate the withdrawal symptoms, not to keep them high. They are referred to an outpatient program upon release. 45% stay in treatment for 120 days. The program leads to less recidivism and leads to the costs to society coming down.

Recovery and Rehabilitation is a better way forward.
