## **Judge Stan Jones**

Judge Stan called the usual first of the month questions about birthday and anniversaries. Birthdays included Mike Winegardner, Ian Napier and Tom Heidegger. Wedding anniversaries for September included Gary Scofield, Dick Richter, and Jerry McGuire. Jan Griffin has her 15th Rotary Anniversary, and Cynthia Vaughn is celebrating one year since she opened her Magnolia Music Studio, which has gone from one to 5 teachers!

Judge Stan asked the group to put in for weather without blowing dust today, and then asked for Brags. Cindy Reentz (nee Johnson) talked about her recent wedding, which was held at the Oregon coast. She not only gained a husband, but also learned she has two



new grandchildren on the way. Pat Haggerty put in for good neighbors who not only were fine with her new decorative block fence plans, but decided to do their own yard so the both saved money. Larry Lowry thinks his sister in law is cursed and attracts bad weather (she is headed to Hawaii now and there are three typhoons taking aim at the islands). He also reported his wife Deb is doing very well since her knee surgery.

Speaking of surgery Hal Williamson put in for the one-year anniversary of the special stent he had put in. He was the first in the State for the type of procedure that went through his arm. He also mentioned he had suspended major charitable donations due to House Resolution 644 not being passed yet by the Senate. This Resolution is about certain kinds of charitable contributions and deductions, such as food donations and donations from IRA funds. He urged contacting Senate members to have it passed.

Pete Rogalsky apologized for missing his assigned slot at the Fair to sell Duck tickets, but he had a meeting come up. Jon Putz said he was there and three of them sold over 100 tickets. Jan Jackson mentioned his Alaska cruise last week. He reports that of the six cruises he and his wife have taken, this one was the most scenic.

## Program

Stan Jones introduced Erich Bolz, the Richland Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Programs. He has been with the Richland School District for over 9 years doing various programs such as Special Education and Federal Standards. Bolz stepped in today for Robert Garza to talk about "Communities in Schools." This is a program aimed at dropout prevention that has been active nationally for 35 years. It coordinates the efforts of volunteers to work inside the schools to help kids at high risk for dropping out. The growing problem of poverty in our community is illustrated by the increase over the past few years to 4000 students in the



Richland system qualifying for assistance in the school lunch program. In general, lower income kids are at higher risk to drop out, as are students with poor English language skills. Poor kids are more likely to be hungry, to have trouble with transportation to school and to be homeless. They also can't afford the fees for extracurricular activities that keep some students interested in school. All of this makes dropping out more likely.

People who do not finish high school are more likely to require social services, more likely to spend time in jail and on average earn \$300,000 less than HS graduates over their lifetime. The idea is to turn this around by keeping kids in school to give them a better chance to succeed in life. Even beyond working with HS students, Bolz sees the need to work with kids in elementary school and younger to change the patterns that lead to dropping out. Support at ages birth to five years will result in a healthier child ready to come to school and learn as nearly 85% of mental development occurs by age five. The Richland Schools have an 86% on-time graduation rate compared to a State and National average of 80%. While above the average, Bolz would like to see this closer to 95%.



Somehow they got by and Ms. Funkhauser had the support and encouragement to excel in school and is now about to complete her

Masters degree. As part of the Communities In Schools program, she travels to various schools to aid children (there are nine in the program). She said when a child feels sick, it may actually be due to hunger. She was able to help one such child when she sent a note home with the girl. The girl's mom came in the next day saying she had just left an abusive situation and had to leave most of their things behind. Funkhauser was able to give her food, toiletries and school supplies to help get her past the crisis. Another time a girl was sent home from school for inappropriate dress, but it was the only thing she had as she and her Mom were living at a shelter. The program partners with Goodwill and was able to get her some school clothes.



Funkhauser picks up donations from churches, individuals and organization including food clothes, and especially school supplies. She believes lowering the barriers for kids to get to and stay in classes. She also helps students get other help. There is a program for kids that become homeless and are staying at a shelter or other place outside of the school boundary. They can get transportation to the original school until they are settled in a more permanent situation. Funkhauser reports that these small acts can have big benefits to the kids involved.
