Catholic Family and Child Service

Jessica Malling and Adrienne Dean presented a summary of the activities and programs of CFCS. Not the least of these is Kids Day. This year it takes place on the coming Tuesday. Special edition newspaper sales are to occur on street corners throughout the Tri-Cities, at \$1 per. The proceeds will benefit kids of all ages, from infancy to teens, with the many services offered by the organization. In fact, volunteers can help sell the papers by phoning 946-4645 to sign up. Workers' hallmark is the free red T-shirt.

The scope of CFCS, which has no religious or other restriction when it comes to people in need, served 19,000 people last year.



Activities of CFCS include 15 programs, all but two benefiting children. Some are—

- Adoption.
- Foster Care, with efforts to find the best homes for children, place them in classes, and help them become adults. Some kids, who know nothing else but foster homes, are provided support in all aspects of living.
- Pre-maternity Services: Pre-pregnancy tests, help in obtaining medical care, nutritional program.
- Parenting Classes. Pregnancy management, instruction on bonding with infants, counseling for children, efforts to keep young parents in school.
- Counseling Services. This includes a contract with the state for low income and Medicaid recipients. It also includes counseling by therapists from individual to family counseling.
- Child Care Resource and Referral. Information is provided as to where to find child care resources.

There is also counseling as to how better to manage children's needs.

- Elder Service. Senior companions are given to those over 65 who may lack support. Volunteers over 55 supply extra help for the seniors and receive a small stipend. They take them to doctor's appointments, go grocery shopping with them, and in general, assuage their loneliness.
- Volunteer Chore Service. Volunteers build wheelchair ramps and make homes handicapped-accessible.
