# Judge Jon Putz

Judge Jon started off by asking Chris and Jeanne to put in something for their long-winded "Public Service Announcements." ## Program

Pam Brown-Larson was a great last minute stand-in speaker. Pam is the executive Direction of Richland's Hanford Communities Program that provides information and community outreach on the Hanford work. Since it is hard to get people out to meetings to learn what is going on, her office also produces two to three informative TV programs each year that are played on local cable channels. Pam introduced one of these programs about the Hanford Plutonium Finishing Plant clean up.

For more than twenty years, there has been clean up work going on at the plant, headed by CH2MHill. The plant took enriched uranium produced at the reactors and produced plutonium either as metal, or as a powdered oxide. This went out in hockey puck sized disks. An add-on to the facility





was the Americium Recovery unit that recovered uranium and americium from wastes. One part of this is called the McCluskey Room. There, in 1976, a reaction occurred in the glove box area that blew up a glove box and showered Senior Chemical Operator Harold McCluskey with radioactive heavy metals. McCluskey spent 5 months being treated and survived. He died at 76 years old from an unrelated heart condition. The area was isolated due to the contamination and never used again. It presented particular challenges to the clean up work, which must be done wearing heavy protective gear and breathing apparatus

When work was stopped in 1989, there was uranium left in the facility in various stages of production. The first effort was to recover and remove this material. This material went to



Savannah River. There was a plant being built that could turn this material into usable reactor fuel. However, it has not been completed due to cost and schedule overruns. The last of

the plutonium and americium was sent to Savannah River in 2009. They are now dismantling and demolishing the facility. The 196 tall thin "pencil" tanks have been removed and many smaller auxiliary buildings have been demolished. The plan is to have the main building demolished to the floor slab by the end of 2016. The demolition debris has some radioactivity and is being buried at the on site superfund area. The last thing to come down will be the tall smokestack. Pam noted that the clean up work was slow this summer due to the high heat, which is unbearable in the heavy protective suits.

Pam added she was on site once when the "Criticality Alarm" went off, which is a very distinctive ahooga sound that means to evacuate. It caused a lot of agitation while workers tried to hurry out of the protective gear to leave. Luckily it was a false alarm. Jan Jackson added he was asked out there to do some photography, and warned his chaperone that one of his wide-angle camera lenses had a thorium coating to give sharper images. He didn't think it would be a problem, but as they entered the "Chute" with the radiation detectors at the building, the alarms went off and shut down the whole building. It took some minutes to sort things out and Jan was not allowed to take the lens inside.

Larry Lowry recalls reading the safety materials to do some plumbing work on the site. It stated if the ahooga alarm was heard to "run" ...just that, Run! He asked where to run and the chaperone said "anywhere you can."
