
A Directed Address

The Washington Policy Center, described as a statewide non-partisan, non-profit think tank, subsisting mainly on donations and contributions, consists of six research centers. Each specialty center has its own director. They look into all of the issues across the state that are vital to us. In the past year, their Eastern Washington offices were opened. An Eastern Washington Advisory Board is in place. Chris Cargill, Director of the Eastern Washington Office, spoke. He directed his comments at Initiative 1098, that which consists of a state income tax. Obloquies and pejoratives thereon were plentiful.

The pervasive argument against it is the ability of the legislature to manipulate it in such a way as to tax everyone eventually. Although it is written as a tax on high incomes, it is merely an opening gambit.

Several points, all against the initiative, developed this argument:

- Is it constitutional? In order to be so, a tax must conform to the Uniformity Clause, which requires it to apply to everyone across
 - the board, not merely to one part of the population. As written, the initiative does not do this.



- In states that have no income tax, there has been an 18% increase in jobs, as contrasted to a 9% increase in those with an income tax.
- States do best with either an income tax or a sales tax. We would have both. As an example, New Jersey, with both, had a \$70 billion net loss. The wealthy have moved away, leaving less taxable people to fill the gap.
- Where would the new revenues go? A resultant B&O and property tax credit would be good, but would not offset the added income tax.
- Could the income tax expand? A look at the history of the sales, gas, property, and unemployment payroll taxes leaves little doubt as to the direction an income tax would take.
- This tax will be based on gross income, before deductions.
- It is presented as an initiative, not an amendment, allowing the legislature to alter it.
- It would tax income generated in WA for out-of-state investors, making ventures in WA less attractive.

The point was made that many publications oppose the initiative, largely on constitutional grounds.

John Jay: The right to tax is the right to steal.

Will Rogers: Your life and property are at risk when the legislature is in session.

Robert Heinlein: Beware of strong drink. It can make you shoot at tax collectors – and miss.
