Dave Larkin's remarks and video addressed the end game in the polio campaign. On 10/24, World Polio Day, it was announced that the polio-endemic countries have been reduced from 125 to four since PolioPlus began in 1985. Sierra Leone, Liberia, and Niger have been taken off the active outbreak list. Rotary is prepared to respond rapidly in cases of outbreaks, as was recently demonstrated in Tajikistan.

\$150M has been raised toward the \$200M goal internationally. Our club goal for this year is \$5K.

## Judge Jeanne

For one with a case of jet lag, this jurist performed alertly, first extracting birthday and anniversary fines, then launching into a quiz based on the Rotarian Magazine. Brains were tapped to enumerate humanitarian projects worldwide involving Rotary. She pointed to page 40 where is described World Vision + Rotary and the resulting sustainability.

Our Barbara won a golf amenities certificate valued at \$162. This went through an auction resulting in two bids of \$75. To the two bidders went the benefits and to Rotary went the bucks. Author Mark got in just under the wire to part with a tenner for his book e-mail.

#### **World Vision**

In a slight departure from the customary, Pete introduced the speaker. It was Kim Lorenz, a long-term Tacoma Rotarian. In the cause of World Vision, he has given of himself, full-time, to make a considerable difference throughout the world. He gets matching money from World Vision to match Rotary projects.

World Vision is a Christian faith-based organization. Christianity, but not all religions, has an imperative to serve the poor. WV does not proselytize, teach religion, nor do anything that could cause the feeling that any one religion is favored over others.

The goals, recurrently stated, are to provide: Water, Health Care, Food and Agriculture, Literacy, and Economic Development. Peace and the alleviation of poverty are closely related. From a standpoint of sustainability, it is significant that World Vision stays on with any project in any area. This is in contrast to Rotary officers who come and go



as terms expire and new ones begin. As well purposed as they may be, they do not have the on-site permanence of World Vision. Small projects can and do die out.

Giving people the wherewithal to raise their children, spend time with and instruct them is vital. Ignored, the children can turn to terrorism and other crime. Throughout the Third World, large families prevail, in the expectation that many will perish and a few will survive to do the work and look after the old.

The funding and participation of World Vision make it the largest privately funded humanitarian organization in the world. World Vision is prepared and equipped for a presence at any disaster scene, i.e., the Indian Ocean tsunami and the Haiti earthquake.

Its budget is 30% for relief, 70% for development. In any World Vision country, 99% of the staff is indigenous. For any project, these people do organization and training in preparation for a sustained effort. The resultant improvements, such as wells, are operating for years thereafter. Smaller projects are not as durable. Small donations, when multiplied by matching funds along the way, grow to significant proportions, as he illustrated with numbers.

Self-sufficiency is dramatically attained by micro-financing. The mechanism was convincingly reviewed in this talk. Numbers and accomplishments in several African countries were given as illustrations.

Who ever doubted that one person could cast so wide a shadow in the cause of humanity?
