Program

Gordon Bopp introduced Tammy Taylor, the CEO of the National Security Directorate at PNNL. She provided an overview of DOE's national laboratories. The 17 labs constitute a national intellectual asset for more than six decades. They tackle large-scale, long-term research and development challenges that are typically beyond the scope of universities or private industry. PNNL's mission is Mission is to "transform the world through courageous discovery and innovation." Currently, PNNL employs 4,300 scientists, engineers and non-technical staff who have published 1,168 peer-reviewed papers and been awarded 85 U.S. and foreign patents granted; 264 invention disclosures.



Science and technology development at PNNL is funded by a variety of sources, including DOE, Homeland Security, other U.S. government agencies, and through private industry. These funding sources provided more than \$930 million in the Lab's FY13 operating budget. One reflection of the



Lab's success are its awards for discovery and innovation. The R&D 100 Awards – known as the "Oscars of Invention" have presented 90 R&D 100 Awards to PNNL over the years. (An interesting side note is that one our members received an R&D 100 award for inventing the wireless modem.) Meanwhile, the Federal Laboratory Consortium (FLC) Awards for excellence in technology transfer has presented 78 awards to PNNL since the program began in 1984 – by far the most of any DOE national laboratory.

The Lab has established five major objectives that address some of the nation's most important problems. They are:

- Chemical Imaging of Dynamic Systems
- Chemical Conversions for Sustainable Energy
- Efficient and Secure Power Grid
- Disruption of Illicit Nuclear Trafficking
- Enhance Staff Productivity and the Research Experience - we will maximize our scientific impact by reducing the administrative burden on our most critical asset – talented people

PNNL's campus is changing. Older, obsolescent buildings in south part of the campus are being closed while new facilities are being built in the northern portion of the campus and across Horn Rapids Road on federally-owned land. Six new laboratories have been built in recent years and more are planned in the near future. PNNL in involved with other unique facilities on or near the campus, including the Environmental Molecular Sciences Laboratory, the Bioproducts, Sciences and Engineering Laboratory (BSEL) with Washington State University Tri-Cities,

PNNL is also a good neighbor. In FY2013 they invested over \$610,000 in area philanthropic and civic organizations. Since 1965, Battelle – PNNL's operating contractor – has invested more than \$24.5 million to improve science, education and quality of life in the community. Since 2005, the Lab staff have volunteered more than 175,000 hours to community projects. In 2013 alone, they provided more than 22,800 hours for 54 local organizations.
