Dave Lemak and Rotary Foundation

Dave first showed a film depicting Rotary's worldwide activities with emphasis on PolioPlus and its global impact. Prominent features included the involvement of the Gates Foundation and its generous grant, the cooperation of Islamic leaders in disabusing people of bad ideas about vaccination, moratoria on fighting in order to immunize children. Smallpox is eliminated, Polio is on the way out, and a malaria vaccine may be an addition. Only a few districts in a few nations, subject to strong efforts, lack immunization. The statistics regarding Polio, are more than impressive.



Following this display of the work of Rotary

Foundation, Dave first reviewed its history in light of its stated mission of improving health, support of education, and alleviation of poverty. From its initial concept in 1917 with a donation of \$26.50, it exceeded \$5000 in 1928, and now has contributions in excess of \$1 billion. He gave the dates of each successive creation of RF. These are: Ambassadorial Scholarships, Group Student Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, Matching Grants, The 3H Program (Health, Hunger, and Humanity) which itself gave rise to Rotary Volunteers, PolioPlus, Rotary Grants for University Teachers, and Peace Forums. All of these, as is so well recognized, are jewels in the crown.

He then went through all of the Individual Recognition Opportunities:

- Sustaining Member. The donation of \$100 or more per year to the Annual Program Fund confers this status on a Rotarian. The accumulated amount leads to a Paul Harris Fellowship.
- Paul Harris Fellowship. A member becomes a Paul Harris Fellow upon the donation, in stages of at once, of \$1000. The club may create a Paul Harris Fellow in light of exceptional Service Above Self. Members for two years or less (Dave hopes to make it three) can achieve Paul Harris Fellowship on the donation of \$500. The club will match it with \$500.
- Sapphires and Diamonds. Each additional fulfillment of a PHF requirement adds a sapphire (up to five) to a Paul Harris pin. Beyond the sapphires come rubies, to a maximum of three.
- Other awards, for much larger contributions, were described. (They are seldom seen).

Wills and Estate Planning

A Benefactor is one who allocates \$1000 in his/her will or gives \$1000 to the Permanent Fund. Special pin insignia identifies such a person.

Club Recognition Opportunities include:

- Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY), in which each member contributes \$100 in one year—or if 100% of member contribute some amount to the Annual Program Fund in a given year.
- 100% Paul Harris Club, to wit, Every member a Paul Harris Fellow. This earns a place for the club name on a plaque at RI Headquarters.
- 100% Sustaining member Club.

Calculation has it that \$250 in contributions saves a life somewhere in the world. This is a good reminder.

Periodically, this is a worthwhile review.
