Program

John (Des) Howarth was introduced by Speaker Chair Gordon Bopp. Howarth is a World War II veteran of the Royal Canadian Air Force and the US Army Air Force. He was born in Canada but moved to the US. He graduated from University of Michigan and later took a Master's of Education from UCLA, leading to a 40-year career in education and newspaper writing. He lives in the Tri-cities and was married for 66 years to Ann, before her death. Their two sons have served in the military and are both involved in law enforcement. He is also a 50-year member of the Lions Club. Des joked at the time he joined



the Lions Club, the saying was that "Rotary had the money but the Lions had the fun." However, he thought we seemed like a very fun group.

Des started his talk with a brief description of the start of WWII and sentiments in this country at that time. As he was about to start college in 1941, the US started the draft. Rather than end up in infantry like his father had, he tried to join the US Air Forces. Failing that effort, he went across the border to Canada and joined the RCAF. Flying was presented as very glamorous and exciting, but he later found out how dangerous it could be.

After training in the Canadian version of Siberia of Brandon, Manitoba, he became a Navigator. He received his commission and a wing (navigators get only one) 71 years ago this date. He headed to England to start his flying career, but when the US joined the war, he transferred to the Army Air Forces. He flew briefly in B-17s before going to a B-24 Liberator and joining the secret electronic warfare squadron. The role of this squadron was to be out ahead of the bombing raids and try and jam German Radar and communications to clear the way for the bombers to get to their targets. They would fly out to the assigned station and circle at about 20,000 feet and run the jamming gear. They would remain on station for three to five hours. The stations were often in the North Sea off of Norway or in the English Channel. The plane had about a dozen crewmen. The squadron is directly credited with saving at least 60 planes and over 600 crewmen.



Des reports they never came under fire while on station but without that flying was still dangerous and a few of the squadron planes were lost at sea or crashed. When he was only a few hours short of the 300 hours of combat missions he was obligated to fly, his plane had problems as they were taking off and crashed. He got out of the burning plane but three crew members were killed. He injured his shoulder and shortly after returned to the US to recuperate. This was the end of his military career. He attended a reunion and memorial service in 2011 back at the airbase in Long Marston, UK, and talked at the service.

Des had a few asides and personal stories in his talk and also brought a table full of memorabilia including his medals and a model of the airplane he flew in. It was a fascinating talk of both personal and world history.
