Tri-City Food Bank

John Neill is executive Director of the Tri-City Food Bank. As such, he has an unobstructed view of this barometer of the direction of the economy. He provided some numbers that were, at the very least, disquieting.

Presently there are three food banks, located in Richland, Kennewick, and Benton City. They are staffed exclusively by volunteers, now numbering 110. Consequently, 98.5% of each dollar goes for food. Sixteen tons of food are distributed each week. The demand is increasing. It rose 15% in 2009 and another 10% in 2010. More is anticipated for 2011.

A diversity of volunteers consists of individuals, service clubs, and products of the court system. Judges sentence many to community service. While felons may not enjoy this type of "volunteering," it is preferable to incarceration.



High school students make enthusiastic volunteers. Collections occur every day of the year. There is a pickup at Albertson's at 7AM. Currently, Kennewick, with its low-income housing, receives 46% of the total, followed by Richland and Benton City. Nobody is turned away. All that is required is residency in one of the venues, a picture ID, and, for new clients, a statement of need. No proof of income is required.

50% of food comes from groceries. As food approaches expiration date, it is donated. Meat is obtained at cost, that is, the same price as would be fetched at a rendering plant. Game is accepted if it is wrapped commercially. Other sources are donations, food drives, and Second Harvest. This is a large source. Also, there are fresh vegetables from farmers and private gardens, resulting in a lot of tomatoes and zucchini in the fall.

The changes he has seen:

- The volume and mix of people are changing. Clients are often better dressed than previously. This bespeaks a drop in solvency among those who had independence in better economic times. In fact, many are uncomfortable at being seen at the food bank. It is made a point to avoid eye contact with them
- The trend is to more unemployed and underemployed in the current economy. Thus arises the

greater dependence on the Food Bank. The process is made as compassionate and easy as possible on them, recognizing the pride factor.

• Clients declare the number of residents in their dwellings. As a result of our high rents, families are moving in together. Two and three families may now inhabit a unit. With the number of children and adults known, consignments are made accordingly.

The atmosphere is as close as possible to that of a grocery store. Nobody wants to be there. No questions are asked. Some consideration is given to nutrition, with less weight given to pastries and cereals.

What we can do:

- Food drives, as done by churches and the Boy Scouts.
- Cash drives, keeping in mind that for each dollar donated, \$3 worth of food can be bought.

The Kennewick facility, under heavy demand, is becoming obsolete. It is hoped to buy an adjoining lot and build a new fo0od bank to meet the demand. A new freezer will soon be needed.

For the homeless, they customize food, there being no stoves, ovens, nor freezers. He gave the lugubrious estimate of 2500 homeless teens in Richland.

This was a poignant view into a less visible segment of our Land of Plenty.
